Art Exhibition in Timaru

I'm very excited to be able to invite Fairlie folk to visit my art exhibition "Distant Lands" currently on at the Aigantighe Art Gallery in Wai-iti Road in Timaru until 26th July.

We moved as a family to Fairlie permanently in 2014 so stories of immigration are very relevant to our experience.



The paintings in the exhibition are inspired by old Tennent family photographs and letters from the time of their immigration to the distant and exotic land of New Zealand in 1864 and some of these original documents are on display with my paintings.

Travelling with his widowed mother, two sisters and three brothers, husband Hayden's Great Grandfather Robert Tennent was 15yrs olds when he arrived in Lyttelton on board the ship 'The British Empire' on September 6th, 156 years ago.

Two gentlemen on board the ship published a small weekly newspaper for the 646 passengers 'The British Empire Gazette' and I've painted the stories contained in the pages of this paper after researching and reading.

After a short time in Christchurch the family settled first in Wanganui but relocated because of the Maori troubles to Nelson. In Nelson young Robert joined the Bank of New South Wales and was a founder and first secretary of the Nelson Football Club, the first Rugby Club in New Zealand.

Robert was with Bank of NSW for the next 53 yrs and was bank manager in Nelson, Blenheim, Auckland, Dunedin, Invercargill, Wanganui and Timaru where Hayden's grandfather was born and his infant twin brother is buried. A keen sportsman, Robert was also associated with the development of the golf links at Timaru and at Invercargill.

Robert's youngest brother William was Secretary of the Timaru Harbour Board from 1880 until 1901.

A lot of us have stories of our families history and immigration to New Zealand and Australia and I'm really interested in these tales of early settlement. CONT...

Please note that I'm writing this from a totally personal perspective! I've always loved the sentiment *"wanting what you have, not having what you want"*. It was hard to see what I had during the past three years of upheaval in my life, especially when adversity was staring me in the eyes. Last year, with a new decade approaching, I decided to make some changes. It was angst-ridden but also exhilarating and empowering.

We too often talk about our problems and not the things we already have that make us feel content. As Kiwis we are modest and don't like to brag or display smugness. A lot of Kiwis have an altruistic nature and care deeply about others, but living in a mostly egalitarian society we can sometimes victimise ourselves when feeling inequality.

I have been called "opinionated" in many instances. To me, being opinionated is not a negative trait – it means you can think critically and are able to portray your thoughts to make positive, proactive changes. I loved my job, but I was feeling frustrated with it. I'd make a big decision that took away some financial stress. My life was getting back on track and I was able to enjoy what I had, but I still wasn't content.

Making the decision to resign after 25 years in librarianship was tough, but I wanted to eventually be able to help and support others through trauma. I enrolled at Massey as a distance psychology student and took some time to relax before semester one started. Doing so made me realise how rushed and on edge I was. With more time on my hands, I decided to investigate the relationship market and I tapped into Tinder, with absolutely no regrets!

Life is tough. It throws us some curveballs and recently one giant one was hurled at the Earth on a worrying scale. Lives were lost, global economies crashed, unemployment, financial and emotional stress levels soared. It is okay to feel sadness and anxiety because that is how our brains acknowledge and process the changes that have occurred, and it can be exhausting. As humans we rely on primal instincts as the "fight or flight" response kicks in. We have seen this in our ability to get creative in the kitchen during isolation. Food is a primary reinforcer - it makes us feel good because we are feeding our survival.

To be able to see positives in Covid-19, we need to allow our brains time to process what has happened, but then gear ourselves up for change. As an island nation, New Zealand is well placed to be reasonably self-sufficient. New markets are opening with government financial backing and it's time for those with entrepreneurial skills to take part in redefining society. It's also time for Kiwis' altruistic natures to shine by supporting and encouraging each other. Let's be optimistic and truly live up to the "she'll be right" Kiwi psyche. Everyone has the opportunity to pick themselves up and make the most of a new situation. Speaking from experience, it's not easy, but it is truly rewarding.

Message from Reverend Andrew McDonald

The past two months have been the cause of great challenge for us, but also a time of significant insight and clarity. Many people have noticed, some for the first time, birdlife in the garden, being able to enjoy fresh air, reconnecting with old friends and family members. Perhaps you, like me, have made some decisions shaped by your experience of this time? A few weeks ago I cancelled our Netflix subscription and re-joined the great boutique video store in Christchurch, Alice in Videoland. There was a story on the Guardian site last weekend about New Zealanders choosing to support local bookshops instead of buying books from Amazon or Book Depository. This crisis has caused many of us to make decisions about what values we want to live by.

One of the questions many of us are asking at the moment, particularly with the likelihood of an economic recession ahead of us, is "how long will our change of heart last?" "Will we see genuine and lasting change as a result of our experiences during lockdown or will we just get sucked back into the frenzy of life as usual?" "Will we forget what good we have discovered?" "Will we abandon our good discoveries and run after more strain and stress?" Or will our reordered lives express the "beauty and peace" we have been created for?

Recently I came across a compilation of letters written over the past few weeks expressing the good things discovered or rediscovered during lockdown in the United Kingdom. Written by playwrights, artists and community leaders, these letters were addressed to themselves one year from now - once life has gone back to so-called normal. Because we have a predictable tendency to revert to our "old ways" rather than living into the fullness of our best insights, the letters are to remind the reader of the good they experienced, the resolutions made, and to remind them to continue the simple, lifegiving activities they did during lockdown.

As you reflect on you own experience, what are the true and good things you will need to be reminded of one year from now, or two years from now, when the false gods of modern life hurry by, beckoning you to join them? Perhaps, today is good day to go home and write yourself a letter.

Bardic Tradition Returns to the Mackenzie

Billy the Bard is a character created by Tekapo resident William Beauchamp to entertain and educate locals and visitors in the legends and literary traditions of The Mackenzie Country. Beauchamp descends from early clans of the Mackenzie, his great-grandparents, Mary (Nalder) and George Murray, once lived in a cob cottage on the lakeshore, and his grandparents Molly (Murray) and Dick Beauchamp drove flocks of Merino with a gypsy wagon in search of grazing during harsh winters.

Returning home to Tekapo three years ago, Beauchamp began roasting chestnuts at a stall in the village. Last year he developed Billy the Bard after recognising a hunger amid tourists for local character and story. "Busking suits the bardic lifestyle and involves people in the kiwi tradition of koha, given and received."

Traditionally in Celtic lands, a Bard was employed by nobility to skite about the glorious deeds of his employer, and ridicule those opposed, often in long and poetic ballads.

As a more modern incarnation of this fine tradition, Billy the Bard has been appearing on the Tekapo lake-shore most fine evenings since September last year with a busking show entitled 'Calling out the Stars.' During this performance the first stars and planets to be seen in the dusk sky are Called to with traditional Waiata.

This Story-telling has become a popular feature of the Bards work and returns this month after hibernation, together with some more stories uncovered in seclusion. Look out for Billy the Bard in cafes, bars and at lonesome crossroads throughout the Mackenzie as he recites all 22 verses of the late Ernie Slows epic ballad 'The Godley Ghost.'

Close study of all available literature about one James or John Mackenzie has uncovered the ghost of a character about whom there is something both heroic and deeply tragic. It is here, with this legendary explorer after the

human dream, that Billy the Bard finds his next subject matter. There is also the envisioning of a scene wherein the ghost of Jock Mackenzie meets and converses with the spirit of this basin, ka hui Tipua, the legendary assembly of ogres who guarded these lands against exploitation, and perhaps still do. 





Police Notebook: Russell Halkett - Fairlie

The seasons are changing which makes for different driving conditions that can catch you out. Be alert out there on the road and drive to the conditions at all times. Make sure you maximise your visibility by clearing all that frost off all your car windows and put your headlights on early and at any time if visibility is not too good. Make sure you can see and be seen.

It has been good to get out of lock down and get out and about again. There were a few reports of tension in the house and people getting grumpy with each other which required some police intervention.

A Timaru man was lucky to escape serious injury when he failed to pay attention to his driving and hit a bridge near Albury.

An Ashburton couple also had a narrow escape when they encountered a deer on the road near Kimbell on a dark night. The car received little damage but the deer was not so fortunate.

A Fairlie man had a run in with some black ice at Burkes Pass which ended badly. The vehicle was extensively damaged but the use of good safety equipment prevented serious injury to the driver.

A Geraldine man and his mates were caught spot lighting farm paddocks from the roadsides in the Mackenzie pass area. They had permission to hunt a farm block there but they had spilled out along the roadside encroaching onto neighbouring farms. They were also in breach of the Covid19 regulations.

The Fairlie Caltex reported a petrol drive off by an unknown offender.

Seven chickens were stolen from a property on Arthur St.

There have been a few reports of people out walking or biking along poorly lit rural roads in the evenings failing light. It is good to be out exercising but make sure you can be seen by the other road users. Put on a Hi-Vis vest and have some good lighting front and back. Give yourself the best chance possible to return home safely.

As always I would encourage anyone to contact me about anything they have witnessed or are concerned about. You can remain nameless if you wish.

1 REFLECTIVE GEAR
Many athletic jackets, shoes, and pants are made with reflectors. Reflective bands or tape can also be used to be seen.

2 LIGHT THE WAY
Use a headlamp or flashlight to light up your route.





3 BE CAUTIOUS OF TRAFFIC
Be aware of traffic around you. Face oncoming traffic to see approaching headlights.



4 BRING A FRIEND
Drivers are more likely to see two walkers than one. Walking with a friend is also more enjoyable.

Jamie Oliver's Mustard Chicken

| 400 g chicken breasts | 4 t mustard powder |
| a few sprigs of rosemary | rapeseed oil |
| 1 large leek | 4 cloves of garlic |
| white wine | 75 ml cream |
| 1 t wholegrain mustard | salt and pepper to taste |

- Turn the heat on and warm a frying pan.
- Chop your rosemary and sprinkle it over the chicken. Then sprinkle the mustard powder over each chicken breast and then rub them with a bit of rapeseed oil. Fry in pan with oil (add chopped bacon - optional).
- Wash your leeks in cold water, and then finely slice them. Crush the unpeeled cloves into the frying pan. Then stir in the leeks and about 1/4 a cup of wine.
- Check that the chicken is cooked thoroughly through. This should take about 18 minutes. If it is, then add in your cream and then cover the pan and cook for 2 mns.
- Then turn the heat off. Remove the chicken to a cutting board and slice. Stir wholegrain mustard into the sauce that is in the pan. Season to taste.
- Drizzle the sauce over the chicken before serving.


Mackenzie Community Library


Audio Books for Loan






