Lessons From Lockdown

When Kerensa Clark set about planning for this small photographic project, she called it "Excerpts From the Extraordinary". After several responses to the follow-up question of "tell me what lockdown has taught you", she quickly realised a name change to "Lessons From Lockdown" was more fitting, as people shared with her their learnings as business owners on Fairlie's Main Street, from the nation-wide lockdowns.

Her original concept was to capture snapshots of business owners standing at their front doors, as the world emerged from Level Three into Level Two and subsequently this morphed into capturing some businesses as Level One became the new normal. The idea was to show the faces of the people behind the doors and to awaken the sense of community and support for our small local businesses as an uncertain economic future was seeing business closures around the country. Couple this with closed borders, and the tourist hub of Fairlie looks a LOT quieter.

"I wanted to *really* see the people whose lives are behind those storefronts", she explains "I was looking for that raw connection without the tourists and the out-of-town shoppers. I wanted to convey that understanding of 'this is it; this is us.'"

Kerensa approached Heartlands with the idea initially and then invited the Main Street businesses to participate. Many opted out, but a few were keen to be involved. "I liked the concept of capturing businesses at this very surreal time in New Zealand's history. It is also important that historically, we keep hold of this period of time in the story of Fairlie, and so I wanted to help make that happen in some small way".

Kerensa says that it was wonderful to meet many of the street's business owners and to have the privilege of photographing them. She was hoping to compile more photos and stories through the project but thinks that somewhere down the track, there will be room for other interesting narratives to emerge from this time.

"Perhaps in six months I will do a project showing how Fairlie is thriving without the influx of international tourists. I have to admit it is a lot nicer not having to queue down to Four Square in order to get a pie!"

Kerensa's 'real' job is teaching Technology at Mackenzie College but she can never be found far away from her camera.



Under 12s Take to the Ice

The future of Mackenzie Ice Hockey Club is looking to be in good shape. The number of junior players has been steadily increasing over the last three years, with up to 40 under 12 players on the ice each night at practise.

These players make up the 'Kiwi's', a group of children participating in a Learn to Play Ice Hockey Programme some aged as young as 4 years old; and two teams, the 'Rockets' and the 'Sprockets', which both play in the Southern Ice Hockey League competing against teams from Gore, Alexandra, Queenstown and Dunedin.

Two weeks ago a group of 12 children attended the first round of the season, and for the majority of the group their first round ever, in Dunedin. These two teams faced the daunting task of playing 14 games (10 minutes each, across the ice) in 6 hours. Both teams played really well, often against players much bigger than themselves. The Rockets scoring two wins for the day, and the Sprockets scoring four wins.

Our next round is in Alexandra on Saturday the 18th of July. This is then followed by a round at home in Tekapo on Sunday 2nd of August. This is a perfect opportunity for you to come and support our local kids in their only home round of the season.

Imagine you were born in 1900.


- * When you're 14, World War 1 begins and ends when you're 18 with 22 million dead.

A small change in our perspective can generate miracles. We should be thankful that we are alive. We should do everything we need to do to protect and help each other.



The Philanthropy of Philosophy



Having just finished my first philosophy paper, I thought I would share with you how fascinating it was and how I feel we could all benefit from using philosophical thought processes in our day-to-day living.

At the start of the paper, I found it frustrating getting my head around such a different way of thinking - to me it felt like over-thinking things! I didn't really enjoy the paper at the time, but looking back I got a lot out of it and I do try to think more broadly now.

Knowledge was defined by Plato in his tripartite theory as being *justified, true belief*. Philosophers over the centuries have studied, debated, contradicted and overturned this theory. A significant component of philosophy is being prepared to acknowledge that any knowledge could remain indeterminable - "*the only true wisdom is in knowing you know nothing*" (Socrates/Plato, c.400BC). These philosophers had it right - we need to stop being 'know-it-all's' and recognise that great humility comes from not knowing everything.

It is also important to remember that everyone has biases, experiences and conditioning that builds us into the individuals we are. It is beneficial for our sense of belonging/value to have opinions and to feel knowledgeable, but we should also practise being humble, tolerant, respectful of differing views and accepting of others. We are not born with compassion, we are born to survive, so it's something we all need to work at.

There is also a place for critical, sceptical, and pessimistic thinking, especially given the amount of 'fake news' we are constantly fed through social and print media. Our brains naturally select quick thought processing that is often intuitive and reactionary based on our own experiences. To think more cognitively we need to be consciously aware of slowing down our thought processes and critically analysing our surroundings and the information or 'knowledge' presented to us.

Humans appear to be losing the art of communicating properly which leads to ignorance and apathy and I feel it is reaching dangerous levels in terms of a functioning society. We all have a part to play in getting back to the basics of thinking broadly, listening well and practising interpersonal, face-to-face communication skills. It is natural for us to be reactive, but it would be so much more beneficial to society if we turn our thought processes around to think deeply and listen fully to comprehend all viewpoints before reacting. Worth thinking about!

Puaka Matariki - A Celebration of our Southern Stars - Presentation by Victoria Campbell, Kāi/Ngāi Tahu

On 18 July 2020, the Aoraki Mackenzie International Dark Sky Reserve Board is inviting you to a talk on Māori perspective of astronomy and the significance of Puaka Matariki. Matariki is known as the Māori New Year and relates to the Matariki stars in the constellation of Taurus (Pleiades or the Seven Sisters).

Puaka is a star in the Orion constellation. Astronomers also call it Rigel, and it's a blue supergiant star, the brightest in this constellation. Puaka Matariki is a celebration of the rising of the Puaka and Matariki stars in the morning before dawn after the winter solstice.

Victoria Campbell will share a brief history of astronomy and its application from a Māori perspective with a focus on seasonality and time keeping. She will talk about the lunar stellar system and how our interaction with the environment is interconnected and integral in the application of Māori astronomy.

Who are we?

The Aoraki Mackenzie International Dark Sky Reserve was created in 2012. It is the world's largest Dark Sky Reserve (4367 square km) and a recognition of the big skies of the Mackenzie, which are essentially free of light pollution (see <https://www.darkskyreserve.org.nz/about-amidsr/>).

It is accredited by the International Dark-Sky Association (<https://www.darksky.org/>).

Stepping Up – Digital Skills for Life





I am hearing quite a few stories from friends and family back in Aus, about the impacts they are seeing from the increase in numbers of coronavirus in Victoria. There is a feeling of disconnection and discord within their communities as they struggle with going back into lockdown.

Aren't we lucky? We live in a country where we can now choose to be connected ... if we so desire. To connect is the first of the five ways to wellness that I touched on last issue.

Our relationships with others contributes to the quality of our psychological wellbeing, so it's important to socially connect with others. Relationships with people who are close to you, such as family and friends, provide support, enjoyment, encouragement and security. Broad relationships with others within your community may be more superficial, but are still important in providing a sense of belonging, connectedness, self-worth and happiness.

Some tips from the Mental Health Foundation

- * Become involved in groups; join your local craft, sports, choir, hobby or book club and enjoy singing, sewing, playing a card game, visiting gardens or croquet on the lawn together.
- * Walk in nature, listen to the sounds, feel the breeze, touch the bark of a tree.
- * Spend time with pets and animals.
- * Make new connections – ask questions and keep things positive. Remain in the present and listen well to help make the other person feel comfortable
- * If you don't think that you have anything to offer, a smile and a little kindness can go a long way!
- * Have a family 'tech free' day and bring out the old board games you have – you may be surprised at how much fun they still are! Contact a friend you have not seen or spoken to for a while and talk, talk, talk!
- * Or perhaps you could connect to others by writing a story...






Wondering how to get started?

SLOW COOKER COCONUT THAI BEEF

- | | |

| 700-900 grams Beef, cut into bite sized chunks | 1/2 t Pepper |
| 1 t Salt | 400 g Mushrooms, quartered |
| 4 Potatoes, large, diced | 1 Onion, finely diced |
| 1 Carrot, diced | 3 t Garlic, crushed |
| 2 T Green Curry Paste | 400 ml can of Coconut Milk |
| 1 T Brown Sugar | |
| 1 T Cornflour | |

Optional:

- 4 Kaffir Lime Leaves Lime Juice to Serve
Blanched Green Beans

1. Begin by preparing the slow cooker with oil or cooking spray
2. Add the beef to the slow cooker and season well with the salt and pepper.
3. Add these vegetables to the slow cooker.
4. Add to this the green curry paste, garlic, brown sugar and finally pour over the coconut milk (if using kaffir leaves add these now also).
5. Stir to combine and cook on LOW for 8 hours.
6. Stir gently a few times during cooking.
7. At 8 hours take out 1/3 of a cup of the cooking liquid and add the cornflour to this and stir until no lumps remain then pour back into the slow cooker and stir gently to combine.
8. If adding green beans add them now.
9. Cook for a further 45 minutes to an hour to allow sauce to thicken and everything to become tender.
10. Remove Kaffir leaves and discard.

Serve with a fragrant rice or on its own (if using squeeze a little lime juice over the curry before serving). This will freeze well, allow to cool before adding portions in airtight containers to the refrigerator or freezer. Enjoy!

Celebrated Olympic Athletic Champion

– Jack Lovelock, from Fairlie!


Born on 5 January 1910 at Crushington, a small West Coast gold town near Reefton, a young man named John Edward 'Jack' Lovelock later moved with his family to live in Fairlie.

Jack's father, John Lovelock, was employed as manager at Mt Cook Engineering and young Jack attended Fairlie Primary School from 1919-1923. Jack excelled at Fairlie Primary School and was involved with rugby, swimming and athletics. He was also a gifted student and was Dux of the Primary School.

Jack briefly attended the Fairlie District High School but having won a Junior National Scholarship was sent in 1924 as a boarder to Timaru Boys High School.

From 1924-1928 Jack Lovelock attended Timaru Boys High School. As well as being academic he also became the boxing champion and was a cross country runner, while also discovering exceptional talent as a middle distance competitor. At High School Jack set numerous athletics records. In his final year he was the school's boxing champion, was Head Prefect and also Dux of the College.

Jack went on to study medicine at Otago University and was awarded a Rhodes Scholarship to attend Exeter College at Oxford, England. He followed his dream and between 1931-1934 while at university, he further excelled



in athletics. While studying at university he broke the British Mile Record in 1932, competed in the 1932 Los Angeles Olympics, set a mile record in 1933 and won a Gold Medal at the 1934 Empire Games (now known as the Commonwealth Games) in England. At university he was also involved in debating and boxing and in 1933 Jack Lovelock received the Quarrel Read prize at university for his all-round achievements.

In 1934 Jack commenced medical training as a Doctor at St Mary's Hospital, Paddington, in London. During this time he won the special 'Mile of the Century' race at Princeton in England and in 1936 he won his most celebrated event – the Olympic 1500 metres at the Berlin Olympics in a new world record time.

At this time, Olympic winners were presented, along with their medals, a small oak tree – a tree which still stands, growing in the grounds of Timaru Boy's High School, where there is now a fine statue of this running legend.

In 1940, following his athletic career, Jack Lovelock suffered a serious head injury from a fall from a horse and was unconscious for two days. From then on he suffered from ongoing bouts of dizziness and eyesight problems.



In 1945 Jack married Cynthia James, an American woman whom he met in England and in 1947 they moved, with their daughter Mary to USA where Jack worked as a Doctor at the Hospital for Special Surgery and Rehabilitative Medicine in New York's Manhattan.

In 1948 their second daughter Janet was born.

On 28 December 1949, dedicated but unwell, Jack Lovelock went to work at the Manhattan Hospital. At 9.30 am a phone call was made to his wife to say that Jack was unwell and was returning home. Tragically, while waiting at the Church Ave Subway Station, Lovelock fell beneath a train and was killed instantly. He was aged 39 years.

Following Jack Lovelock's amazing world record win in the 1500m race at the 1936 Berlin Olympics and because of his hero status ... there have been books written, a movie made, a set of stamps produced by NZ Post, sporting events and streets named after him.

In local recognition a road on which he trained in Fairlie is named 'Jack Lovelock Track' which runs between School Road and Te Puke Rd off Nixons Road in Fairlie.

On this coming Saturday 18th July 2020, the inaugural Mackenzie Half Marathon will be held at Fairlie with the first prize for both the first male and first female winners being presented with a 'Jack Lovelock Memorial Trophy'. This first time event is already proving to be extremely popular with many competitors and prizes for the half marathon (21.1km) and also 10km, 5.5km run or walk. Late entries are still being taken and organisers are confident of hitting the 400 entries mark.

Third Generation

Self-care - for all times of your life but especially as we get a little older!

With the conversation around mental health in the older person more transparent than ever, the term 'self-care' has become increasingly common. As we age and supposedly wisdom overtakes us! self-care becomes even more important if we want to maintain our independence and well-being!

While it sounds straightforward, self-care is a process that requires attention and effort every single day. So, it's important to understand the value of self-care and how it can be achieved.

For a variety of reasons, many people don't do anything just for them on a daily basis. They might be too busy, too tired, or too focused on others, especially if caring for an ailing partner!

It's important however to understand that self-care doesn't constitute selfishness. Being selfish limits your ability to give to others, whereas self-care enhances it. By focusing on your own wellbeing, you put yourself in a far better position to support others.

Everyone's 'something' is different. Self-care, me time, doing something for yourself – whatever you want to call it, manifests differently depending on the individual. For one person, exercise might be their therapy. For another, it might be their idea of torture. It doesn't matter what the 'something' is, as long as it contributes positively to your wellbeing and helps you reset and recharge.

So we asked a few older local folk for their opinions – do you practice self-care and if so can you share it with me?

- ◆ "I buy a coffee on Fairlie's Main Street most week days and just sit and watch people. Generally I end up talking to someone, but am just as happy to sit and watch!"

- ◆ "I have to go for a walk with my dog every day! 5 minutes is all it takes and I think both the dog and I enjoy the little break'.
