They resorted to taking a helicopter for two hours looking for their dogs, but didn't see them. However they did see a lot of dead possums way up the South Opuha riverbed (the dogs live for possum hunting!) so on returning (feeling extremely gutted they hadn't found them) Hayden Dwyer and a couple of his mates walked from where the possums were, searching all the way down to home.

Again not seeing or hearing anything.

But 20 minutes after Hayden returned home, the Black Labradors arrived at the door. They must have followed their scent home and they hoped Bee wasn't far away.

Their hopes turned to reality yesterday, Monday when as Rebecca put it 'Casual as can be, Bee has strolled home'. Rebecca, Hayden and family thank the community so very much for all of the support, food, cards, messages and offers of help.

Latest Update from the Mackenzie District Community Care Charitable Trust

We have contracted Rooney Earthmoving Ltd and they have begun initial site investigation work which is approximately 30% complete. Once soil conditions improve they will be back to complete the test pitting, topographical survey work and site investigation work, to supply us a full report. We will keep you updated.

The Mackenzie District Council has an Age Friendly Strategy Community Survey coming out shortly and we strongly encourage you to participate in it. The results from this survey will feed into and provide valuable information for the feasibility study that the Trust has commissioned Rationale to do on our behalf, as we proceed with the planning and due diligence re the proposed retirement village.

Annual Report to the Fairlie Volunteer Fire Brigade

The last year has been a mix of curve balls and change. For the brigade, at times it is easy to forget about COVID, but it is ever present and still causing problems. Through the lock down the Brigade set up a plan and all Brigade members stuck to it. Thank you to all for your support and discipline through those difficult times.

The siren sounded 70 times and was made up of 15 Motor Vehicle Accidents, 15 Structure Fires, 16 Scrub Fires, 14 Alarm Activations, 8 Medical Call Outs and 2 Special Services.

In December Chief Fire Officer Phill Mackay announced his retirement from the Fairlie Brigade due to a change of employment and a move to Timaru. The February Meeting will be his last. We would all like to thank Phill for his time and commitment to the Fairlie Volunteer Fire Brigade - his knowledge, experience and commitment to the Brigade was very much appreciated and many of the policies and plans he has set up will help us move forward. We wish Phill well in his new role. At the same time Deputy Chief Fire Officer Ray Gardner announced that he was stepping aside to take up an operational support role within the Brigade, and is still happy to help with training. Station Officer Luke Haugh took on the Deputy CFO role and we thank Luke for stepping up and wish him well in this position.

Katherine Hill joined the Brigade in 2018 to take up the secretary role but she would also like to step aside and take up an operational role within the Brigade. Katherine has brought technology and detail to our meetings, thank you for your time as our Secretary. Edon Bergan has joined the Brigade and taken up the role.

Even though its been a trying year we have had a good number of Fire Fighters away on courses: Luke Howat - Recruit; Marcus - QFF; Luke, Grant, Brett, Wayne - Fire Behaviour; Luke, Damon - Executive Officer; Erin, Iceman - MVA Pump Rescue; ERD Driver - Ethan, Sam, Mike, Allan Gash; Live Structure Burn - Leon, Ben, Sam, Iceman, Erin; Light 4WD - Danny; Medical revalidations all members and Tactical Command - all officers. This is a great effort from members. For the time spent away from their families and work - thank you, and to the training team for mentoring and encouraging the Fire Fighters.

Special thanks goes to the employers of the Fire Fighters and those who are self employed, without your support it would be very difficult for the Brigade to function - we would like to take the time to say thank you to you all.

Severe weather warnings



MetService provides land-based severe weather alerts. These are issued through a system of Outlooks, Watches and Warnings.

Outlooks — stay alert

Outlooks provide a 'heads up' that bad weather is coming in the next 3-6 days but there is some uncertainty about what might happen and where. Stay alert to the forecast and be prepared that you may be affected.

Watches — stay alert

Watches are used when severe weather is possible, but not imminent or certain. When a Watch is in place, stay alert and keep an eye on your local forecast for updates.

Orange Warnings — take action

Orange warnings are used when bad weather will meet Severe Weather Criteria. This could be heavy rain, strong wind or heavy snow.

When there is an Orange Warning, be prepared and take action as appropriate as there could be some disruption to your day and potential risk to people, animals and property. The majority of warnings issued by MetService will be orange.

Red Warnings — take immediate action, act now!

Red warnings are used for extreme weather events that are likely to have significant impact and disruption. This could be for weather like heavy rain, strong wind or heavy snow from events like cyclones.

When there is a Red Warning, act now. Immediate action is needed to protect people, animals and property. Be prepared to follow the advice of official authorities and emergency services.



Evie (age 2.5) and Georgia (1) Rowland try out the new pikler triangle and slide/ladder attachment which is now available for hire at the Mackenzie Toy Library.

The pikler triangle was developed by Hungarian paediatrician Dr Emmi Pikler over 100 years ago with the idea that kids can explore the triangle on their own terms. It can be used from 6 months up to around 5 years old. It doesn't need to be adjusted as the child grows because it works as the foundation on which they reach developmental milestones. Babies can first play underneath it, then use it to pull themselves up, then proceed to climbing.





Every year on 15th July, World Youth Skills Day encourages youth to acquire certain skills that will help them achieve personal success and fulfillment.



The day also raises awareness about the lack of skills that prevent young people from working.

There is a growing concern that youth throughout the world are not able to find employment. There is also concern that youth are not able to receive the proper education or training for their future careers. The number of youth not in employment, education, or training is known as NEET. In recent years, nearly 267 million were classified as NEET. This number is also expected to increase to 273 million in the near future.

To help combat these numbers, organizations are placing emphasis on Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET). This type of education prepares people to work as a technician and allows employees to take up a skilled craft or trade.

Workers around the world have realized some of the many short and long term benefits TVET has to offer such as better chances of employment, higher earning levels, increased job satisfaction, improved flexibility and mobility, and lifelong learning.

Our community embraces this philosophy of developing tradespeople at a young adult age. It's refreshing to see so many young people from our community being fostered into skilled trades and crafts. From electricians, to mechanics to plumbers, vocational training ensures that the most essential needs of our community is met. It also ensures that young people entering the workforce are making liveable wages and experiencing high job satisfaction right out of the gate.

Mackenzie County Scholarship Trust Call for Support

In September 1993 the Mackenzie County Scholarship Trust was established. This Trust was created to provide Scholarships for students first year tertiary studies. These Scholarships may be granted by the board to a student of Mackenzie College, a student of Twizel Area School and a student who is a resident or ratepayer of Mackenzie District (or whose parent is).

The Trust recognises that our students in their remote and sometimes rural setting often require extra assistance because they move out of the District for Tertiary Education, and it aims to facilitate a level of support through the scholarships process.

Unfortunately, interest rates over the last five years have diminished and have been insufficient to generate enough returns to maintain the value of the Scholarships at the previous level. In order to prevent reduction of the capital amount, the trust was fortunate enough last year to obtain interim support from a local business to maintain the capital amount at its present level.

We are once again seeking the support of local businesses to get behind this very worthwhile cause so that we can continue in the spirit of the Trusts' intent to provide assistance to students from this District to offset some of their initial expenses.

Federated Farmers Report



The big issue facing Federated Farmers this month has been the release of the Waka Eke Noa document - to those not in the know, this is agriculture's plan to reduce agriculture's emissions under the government's climate change policy.

In 2019 Feds entered into agreement with most agricultural bodies and the Ministry for Primary Industries and the Ministry for the Environment to come up with a better plan to reduce emissions rather than getting put into the ETS which would have been a blunt instrument to control emissions on farm and potentially send some farmers broke.

The plan presented to government for their consideration still adds costs to New Zealand's most important industry (which this year brought in 52 billion dollars for the NZ economy which provides New Zealanders with the standard of living which we enjoy).

But it potentially provides a pathway for farmers to offset them. Emissions through on farm practices such as planting trees for sequestration for some of their emissions and other on farm changes.

Feds believe that the document is far from perfect and needs more work especially more economic analysis on the impact on the regions and the country. Also, that we don't compromise one of the most important clauses that the government signed up in the Paris Accord on the need to balance food production vs emissions reductions. We will have more problems as a species if we end up with large percentages of the world's population going hungry than if the planet's climate changes.

New Zealand's carbon footprint on the world stage is minuscule yet a lot of the New Zealand public believe we can make a difference and as the Chinese proverb goes a 1000-mile journey starts with one step - remember it's a bloody hard journey if you chop off one of your legs.

Our History

Mackenzie Rugby Sub-Union's Golden Era

With too many men volunteering for the 2nd NZEF at the outbreak of the Second World War the MRSU ceased operations at the end of the 1940 season. The championship resumed in April 1945, before the German's had surrendered, and unlike the First War most of our men had returned home before it had ended.

Sub-Union rugby in New Zealand went through something of a golden era from the end of the war until the early 1950s. Mackenzie was boosted by the arrival of two hydro power scheme clubs; Tekapo in 1946, and Pukaki in 1948, to add to Fairlie, Aorangi, Albury (Southern) and Cave (briefly). Although petrol was still rationed and distances between the likes of Albury and Pukaki were long, the sub-union prospered.

The introduction of the Laddie Heath Shield in 1946 was a huge financial boost for the MRSU. The shield was won or lost on a challenge system between the sub- union rep teams of Eastern Districts (Palmerston), Waitaki (Kurow), Waimate and MacKenzie. At this time the Mt Cook Cup also became a feature of the sub- union's schedule, in 1947 it was played for between the Pleasant Point Club and the winner of the MRSU Knockout competition (Ruth Griggs Cup) at season's end.

The MacKenzie RSU Reps at beaten a strong South Canterbury side 14- 9 at Fairlie in 1945, (only a few weeks after SC had beaten Canterbury 8- 0) so were a force to be reckoned with. The MacKenzie Reps won the Heath Shield in 1947 and 1948, attracting crowds of up to 1,500 to Strathconan Park.

The 1952 season started well enough, but the death of Allan Simpson, after receiving injuries in a match between

Albury and Fairlie, sent shock waves through the Mackenzie County. Most of the clubs were relying on older players to keep the teams going until the next generation caught up. These older players gave up the game in such numbers that it appeared that there would not be enough to warrant a sub- union for the 1953 season, and so it was. At a meeting held at the Aorangi Hall in Fairlie at the end of the 1952 season it was decided to disband the sub- union and establish the MacKenzie RFC, and enter teams in the SCRFU competitions for 1953.

The 5 R's provide a scheme for dealing with waste in our lives by helping us focus on our habits and consumption patterns.

1. Refuse: what you don't need

The first step to a zero-waste lifestyle is to prevent the waste from entering your home in the first place. This involves saying "no" to promotional samples, junk mail, single-use disposables such as bags, straws, cups, and cutlery, or any short-lived form of unnecessary items.

2. Reduce: what you do need

Reducing what you do need implies getting clear about what you need and being mindful about your purchasing decisions. It means to let go of household items that are no longer of use and avoid impulse purchases such as buy 1-get-2 offers, discount products, and processed foods among others.

Reducing not only results in saving more money from expending less but also saving time and becoming more efficient by alleviating physical and mental clutter.

3. Reuse: extend the useful life of the product

Reusing involves repairing instead of throwing and replacing products and switching single-use items by permanent alternatives. This includes replacing plastic bottles with stainless steel water bottles, for instance, using fabric bags, bamboo toothbrushes, or buying unpackaged foods among other solutions. Also buying second-hand and visiting antique stores.

4. Recycle: what you can't refuse, reduce or reuse

Recycling comes as the last option after refusing, reduce and reusing. The reason is, nowadays, we consume and dispose at a higher rate than we are capable of recycling. As a result, many recyclable materials end up in landfills or shipped to developing countries. There are currently three Waste-to-Energy incineration plants in proposal and planning stage in New Zealand. Rather concerning, as Europe is rapidly moving away from these facilities for several reasons but predominantly due to carbon emissions.

5. Rot: what is left

Rot or transform what is left. This applies mainly to organic waste coming from food. There are a few methods to compost your household waste such as the Bokashi method, garden compost, or worm farm.

Successful waste recycling is not about using many items and recycling them all. Instead, it's about making conscious decisions and purchases...

Our District

The Night Sky in August 2022

Bright stars and planets light up the evening sky. **Mercury** makes its best evening sky appearance of the year in August. At the beginning of the month it appears low in the northwest, setting 70 minutes after the Sun. It makes a close pair with Regulus on the 4th. Regulus is the brightest star in Leo but fainter than Mercury. By the end of August Mercury is setting due west two hours after the Sun. The thin crescent Moon will be near Mercury on 29th and 30th.

Saturn appears on the opposite horizon to Mercury an hour after sunset at the beginning of August. It rises four mins earlier each night. By mid-month it is well above the eastern skyline at dusk. It looks like a medium-bright star with a cream colour. The Moon will be near Saturn on 12th.

Jupiter rises due east after 10 pm at the beginning of August. It is the brightest 'star' in the late night sky and shines with a steady golden light. It also rises earlier each night. By the end of August it appears soon after 8 pm. The near-full Moon will be by Jupiter on the night of the 15th-16th.

Canopus twinkles colourfully on the south skyline. It is the brightest true star in the evening sky and the second-brightest star overall. It is balanced by **Vega** low in the north. Orange **Arcturus** is in the northwest, often twinkling red and green as it sets. Vega and Arcturus are the brightest stars north of the equator.

Midway down the southwest sky are 'The Pointers', Beta and **Alpha Centauri**. They point down and rightward to **Crux** the Southern Cross. Alpha Centauri is the third brightest star and the closest of the naked-eye stars

Orange **Antares**, northeast of overhead, marks the heart of the Scorpion. The Scorpion's tail hooks around the zenith like a back-to-front question mark. Antares and the tail make the 'fish-hook of Maui' in some Maori star lore.

Below or right of the Scorpion's tail is 'the teapot' made by the brightest stars of **Sagittarius**. It is upside down in our southern hemisphere view.

The **Milky Way** is brightest and broadest overhead in Scorpius and Sagittarius. In a dark sky it can be traced down past the Pointers and Crux into the southwest. To the northeast it passes **Altair**, meeting the skyline right of **Vega**. Dust clouds in the space between the stars appear as gaps and slots in the Milky Way. Binoculars show clusters of stars and some glowing gas clouds in the Milky Way.

The Large and Small Clouds of Magellan **LMC** and **SMC** look like two misty patches of light low in the south, easily seen by eye on a dark moonless night. They are galaxies like our Milky Way but much smaller.

Mars rises around 1:30 a.m. It is the same brightness as Saturn but orange-red. At dawn mid-month, Mars is just above the Matariki/Pleiades star cluster.

To its right are similar orange stars: Aldebaran in Taurus and Betelgeuse in Orion. The last-quarter Moon will be near Mars on the morning of the 20th.

From places with a low eastern skyline brilliant **Venus** might be seen in the dawn twilight. It rises 70 minutes before the Sun at the beginning of the month; 30 minutes before at the end. It is leaving us behind as it moves to the far side of the Sun. It will reappear in the western evening sky at the end of the year.

Get Ready for the Local Elections

The Electoral Commission begins an enrolment drive today to make sure people are enrolled for this year's local body elections.

'It's time to check you're enrolled, and that you're listed at the right address, so you're ready to vote in October's local elections,' says Ross McPherson, Acting National Manager, Enrolment and Community Engagement.

'Over the next week, we'll be sending an enrolment update pack to everyone on the electoral roll. That's more than 3.5m packs.'

'Check your details when you receive your pack. If they're correct, you're all set to vote. If anything needs changing, go to vote.nz to update your details online or make the changes on the form and send it back.'

'If you don't get a pack by 7 July, it means you're not enrolled or you need to update your address,' says Ross McPherson. 'And if you get a pack that's not addressed to anyone at your house, please send it back.'

People can enrol or update their details online at vote.nz using their New Zealand driver licence, New Zealand passport or RealMe verified identity.

The local elections will be held in October for city, district, and regional councils. The elections are run by local councils and are held by postal vote. Voters need to be enrolled at the correct address to receive their voting papers in the mail.

'Councils make decisions that affect our daily lives on things like rates, rubbish collection, and public transport, so it's important that you're enrolled and ready to have your say this October,' says Ross McPherson.

Now that the weather has turned cold we start to think about freezing water in pipes and cisterns of properties that are not in constant use.

Anecdotally we know that some people put anti-freeze in toilets etc. to try and avoid frost damage. Unfortunately, anti-freeze is fairly toxic and it's not a chemical we want in our water treatment plants where it can cause problems. Instead how about trying one of the other solutions to this age-old problem:

- * Drain your pipes. If you're going to be away for a while this is the best long-term solution to frost damage in your water pipes.
- * Float a ping pong ball in your toilet. When the water freezes the ball will take the strain and pop instead of your toilet bowl.
- * Float a tennis ball in cisterns etc. As the water freezes and thaws the flexibility in the ball should take the strain. A sponge may work in the same way.

In this case frozen balls really are better. To get you started we are giving ping pong balls away to home owners. If you call in to your local Council office in Fairlie or Twizel you can pick up a couple of complimentary balls.

ALSO: Did you know that if you have anti-freeze to dispose of, it can be dropped off at one of the Resource Recovery Parks in Fairlie, Lake Tekapo or Twizel.







This is only a guide. You might still register above the limit even if you follow this. In general it's a guessing game to stay under the limit.
