THREE BOOKS by Psychologist Gwendoline Smith

Last Saturday, Kim, Michael and their team at Reflections Restaurant in Lake Tekapo organised a very successful guiz night to raise money for Gumboot Friday. The funds are used for providing free counselling sessions for young

people. Access to counsellors is not always easy and for those on a waiting list or for those who want to understand better the way they think, there are three books by New Zealand clinical psychologist Gwendoline Smith, that can give a helping



THE BOOK OF KNOWING, Know how you think, change how you feel (Allen & Unwin 2017). Gwendoline's first book is aimed at adolescents. Through relatable situations she teaches teenagers that by understanding their thinking, they are creating a choice in how they respond. She uses a conversational tone, humour and fun illustrations to bring her message across. Not only adolescents will benefit from this book, grown-ups will find the book helpful and it is a tool for parents to talk to their children about their feelings.

THE BOOK OF OVERTHINKING, How to stop the cycle of worry (Allen & Unwin 2020). This book is aimed at a more mature audience but it features the same clear language and humorous illustrations. Overthinking is also known as worrying or ruminating and it's a form of anxiety that many people suffer from. Gwendoline explains the concepts of positive and negative overthinking, the truth about worry and how to deal with the 'thought viruses' that are holding you back.

THE BOOK OF ANGST, Understand and manage anxiety (Allen & Unwin 2021). Angst is a heightened sense of fear, concern, insecurity and uncertainty and Gwendoline explains the ways in which deep anxiety can manifest and gives detailed step-by-step advice on how to cope.

The three books are reasonably priced at \$24.99 each and are highly recommended by overworked psychologists.

Plastic Phase Out

From 1 October 2022 it will be illegal to provide, sell or manufacture certain hard-to-recycle and single use plastic products in Aotearoa New Zealand. Why? Because they regularly end up as waste in our landfills.

The banned items include:

- ♦ Single use plastic drink stirrers
- ♦ Single use plastic cotton buds
- Plastics with pro-degradant additives (eg. some bin liners, dry cleaning bags and pet waste products)
- PVC food trays and containers used for products including meat, fresh produce or baked goods
- Polystyrene takeaway food and beverage packaging (eg. takeaway containers and cups)
- Expanded polystyrene food and beverage packaging including food serviceware and grocery products (eg. instant noodle containers).

Riding for Human Rights with Amnesty International

Are you looking for your next adventure, or an opportunity to start meaningful conversations about the things that really matter in life?

Amnesty International Aotearoa New Zealand is looking for a team of 20 everyday cyclists to join them in a fundraising mission across the Alps2Ocean cycle trail next March. Over six days, we'll cycle 300km across the scenic centre of the South Island, all while raising vital funds to support our human rights research, advocacy and campaigns.

Real change takes time and resources, and we need your pedal power now more than ever to make the changes we want to see in Aotearoa New Zealand. 
The Fairlie Branch (also known as the Eversley Branch) was a branch line running from Timaru to Fairlie, which formed part of New Zealand's national railway network. Its closure came in 1968, but a portion remains open in Pleasant Point as the Pleasant Point Museum and Railway.

Many of you may have noticed some activity along the Opihi River, below the Allandale Bridge through to the Opihi Gorge. ECAN contractors are currently doing some flood mitigation works along with native planting.

The Fairlie community has been given funding, via ECAN's Waitaha Action to Impact Fund to assist with revegetation along the Opihi River over the next two years. The fund aims to build community engagement and action for a better environment in our region.

The Fairlie Lions Club have constructed and maintained a 22km walking track from Kimbell through to the Opihi Gorge for a number of years. Lions Club members average about 500 to 600 volunteer hours per year on track clearing, dangerous tree felling, mowing and flood mitigation works.

I remember when I first arrived in Fairlie, being excited that there was a river walk and then my disappointment and sadness to see that the vegetation along the river and track consisted mostly of exotic weed species such as; willows, sycamores, poplars, gorse, broom, blackberry, old man beard and other herbaceous weeds. There are no remnants of native vegetation along the length of the track until the track is well into the Opihi Gorge.

There are three areas targeted in the initial stages with the first being close to the Fairlie township, downstream of the Allandale Bridge. The second area is near the Talbot Street entrance to the walking track and the third area closer to the Opihi Gorge.

These three pockets would provide islands of native vegetation that will provide a seed source for future plantings with the potential to spread along the river into weed infested areas that may only need minimal disturbance to assist with germination.

Please remember that <u>now</u> is a great time to be planting seedlings in preparation for the Fairlie Seedling Swap and giveaway on Sunday October 30th.

There is no compulsion to growing seedlings to swap, there will still be plenty to give-away! You just have to show up...so mark the date on your calendar!

Meeting people in our community ...

Meet Lu. She is 27 and after the frustration of having her dreams to travel curtailed by Covid 19 for 2 ½ years, Lu is over the moon to be living and working in Lake Tekapo.

Where were you born?

I was born in Shanghai, China (a city with over 20 million residents!) and I have lived there all my life, with the exception of 1 year when



I lived and studied in New York. I have a Bachelor of Science, majoring in Physics.

How was the process, applying for a Working Holiday Visa for New Zealand?

On May 19th this year, When NZ re-opened the online system to apply for a Working Holiday Visa, I applied immediately. There were only 1000 spots for Chinese citizens (under age 30) and I felt very lucky to get one. I had all my documents ready and my visa was approved in June. I arrived in Auckland on June 29th. After 2 weeks there, I saw an advertisement on a Backpackers website and applied for a job doing Housekeeping and Cafe work in Lake Tekapo.

What are you enjoying doing when you're not working?

When I lived in Shanghai I was addicted to my phone. Here in New Zealand I am addicted to walking outside and hiking. Everyday after work, I cannot wait to go for a walk around Lake Tekapo. I am mesmerised by the scenery and I also love studying alpine geography around here. I recently hitchhiked to Mount Cook with a friend and we did the Hooker Valley walk. It was a lovely walk and hitchhiking was fun too. It's so exciting when someone stops to pick you up!

There are so many things I want to do this Summer. I would like to hike some virgin forests and do bird watching, Cook food in the wilderness and maybe go to a Cultural or Music Festival.

I am also studying online towards a Certificate in Mindfulness through a College in Thailand.

What do you love about living in Lake Tekapo?

It is OTHER-WORDLY here. Tekapo has very good Feng Shui (energy). When I came back here the other day after going to Timaru, we drove around the corner and I thought OMG, this is where I live! - this place is unbelievably beautiful.

I also love the supermarket here - that was a surprise for me. There are so many options for someone who's a bit lazy like me, to make a nutritious meal. I love the small brands and the variety of things like chips, yoghurt, muesli and hummus. I want to try them all!

Is Aotearoa Losing Its Dark Sky Cloak?

While most of Aotearoa New Zealand is still cloaked under darkness by night, many of the natural and urban spaces are increasingly lit up by artificial night lighting. What impact does this light pollution have on New Zealand's environment? An upcoming event in Tekapo will explore what is known about the effects of artificial light at night as well as strategies to make sure everyone has access to a dark night sky.

The public talk is presented by Dr Ellen Cieraad, Research and Innovation Manager at the Nelson Marlborough Institute of Technology. Dr Cieraad is a highly qualified research scientist with experience in ecology, environmental science, and sustainability. Her research projects are centred around the impacts of human activities on biodiversity, including the effects of climate change, pesticide use, and light pollution.

The event details are: Friday, 7 October, 7.30pm at the Lake Tekapo Community Hall, 8 Aorangi Crescent. Tickets are cash sales only at the door and are \$10 for adults, \$5 for children/students, and \$25 for families (two adults and three children).

Tekapo Community Board Brief Notes from 21 September 2022 - Matters Under Action:

- Maukatata Reserve in D'Archiac Drive expected to be completed at the end of October.
- Lakefront Rehabilitation work has started along Lakeside Drive, pathways to be poured early October.
- Tavern Island work on this has commenced. This will have an exposed aggregate base for a picnic table and an additional bike rack. Some plantings will also be put in the area.
- Tekapo Community Hall a new custodian has been appointed and will be responsible for keeping the hall clean, showing interested hirers around and generally monitoring the hall usage. Community board members requested council develop an online booking calendar which will show when the hall is available, but all bookings are still to be made direct with council by calling (03) 685-9010.
- Church of the Good Shepherd Community board members held a meeting on site with council staff and church committee members to review the recent grounds tidy up that council have completed. It was agreed that the rocks needed to be repositioned in a more natural state as opposed to in a straight line. Council agreed to action this immediately.
- Alps 2 Ocean/Hamilton Drive Additional government funding has been received to put towards a shelter at the start of the the A2O. Council staff to provide a layout plan for Community board consideration.
- Town Centre Planter Boxes council and board members looking at options for additional planter boxes to be positioned around the village .
- Western Car Park Community board expressed concerns re water pooling in the new kerb & channel area. Drainage options to be looked at. The board also requested additional kerbing be considered to assist in improving the traffic flow. Signage and road markings to be completed next month.
- Water Stations Refill water stations were discussed following receipt of a letter from a member of the public who requested this be revisited by council. Councillor Murphy also requested that any future development projects included a refill water station and/or drinking fountain.

· Section 12 - Signs, Outdoor Lighting and Aerial Distractions The above changes are within the scope of Plan Change 21 and 22, and changes to other provisions (including maps) of the Mackenzie District Plan are not within the scope of Plan Change 21 and 22.

Submissions must be in the format prescribed by Form 5 and must state whether you wish to be heard on your submission. Paper submission forms are available at the Council Offices in Fairlie and Twizel.

The closing date for lodging a submission is 5.00pm Wednesday 23 November 2022.

Once the closing date for submissions has passed, Council will publicly notify all submissions received, prepare a summary of submissions, and will allow a period for further submissions in support of, or in opposition to, those submissions already made.

Council hearings for Plan Change 21 and 22 will then be arranged to consider all submissions. Anyone who has made a submission and indicated that they wish to be heard will have the right to attend the hearings and present their submission.

Any person who has made a submission has the right to appeal against the decision on the Plan Changes to the Environment Court if in relation to a provision or matter that is the subject of the appeal, the person referred to the provision or matter in the person's submission on the proposal.






