Moreh Home – end of an era

The iconic Fairlie landmark that has been known as Moreh for the past 40+ years is to be auctioned on Friday 5th May. The auction will be onsite in the dining room and the community is invited to attend.



Whilst this is not an exhaustive recounting of 'goings on' at Moreh – that has already been attended to - it is fitting to mention some who have had a strong connection to her, just to remind ourselves and any newcomers to Fairlie of the wonderful legacy that Moreh has been.

Of course, Alison Neill's name and personality is synonymous with Moreh, and her vision – inspired by the God she knows - drew many hundreds of people to give selflessly and care for our elderly without them needing to leave Fairlie. Many were paid, and as we know, many were unpaid and gave of themselves. Thank you indeed. This generosity was the core value that outworked the ethos of the 'Moreh way' and is being continued by a new team of people who are looking at establishing a new and more bespoke facility for our elderly. We applaud you and thank you for picking up where Moreh left off.

It is very fitting that the auctioneer for May's auction – Hamish Niles - was born at Moreh, and his father lan, was one of the original signatories to the Moreh Trust Deed!

In the months since Moreh closed, it has had some varied use. You may have seen the Ni-Vans both last year and just recently, who were boarding at Moreh while fruit picking in South Canterbury. And in between those visits, Tim Adams ran a bakery business from the premises.

So, looking to the future, Moreh now sits empty and is ready for a new venture with new owners and fresh vision.



The idea for Fairlie to have a cottage hospital was first proposed by Dr S.G. Trail in 1912. It was a general hospital when Dr Trail sold it in 1915 to Dr Matherson. Upstairs was the doctor's residence and downstairs the hospital. Dr Matheson sold out in 1920 to Dr Fraser. In 1921 it was sold to Mr Biggs. In 1924 the South Canterbury Hospital Board bought it and it was run as a Cottage Hospital with staff living upstairs. In the late 1920s Mrs J Seigert (Kitty) worked as a nursing sister. It officially became a Maternity Home in the late 1960's.










STATION LIFE, WHAT IS IT LIKE?

WINTER WARMERS, Philippa Cameron, \$49.99 BRAEMAR STATION, Carol and Duncan Mackenzie, \$70

Over thirty years ago I was preparing for my first visit to New Zealand. I studied a travel map and concluded that it would be an easy country to

travel in, because there were stations in what looked like remote places. I could be embarrassed about my naivety to mistake high-country stations for railway stations, but I was new to the country and like so many travellers and other new immigrants now, I didn't have a clue!

Settling in Lake Tekapo gave me the chance to visit some of the high-country stations and meet its guardians/ owners. Since Lady Barker described her life on a Canterbury sheep station in the 1850's, and Betty Dick and Mona Anderson did the same in the 1960's, many things have changed at high country stations and some things have stayed the same.

Last year, Duncan and Carol Mackenzie self-published *Braemar Station*, a book celebrating their 50 years of Mackenzie farming life. Duncan had kept daily and accurate diaries over his fifty years of farming and Carol had kept detailed and captioned photograph albums. It is a memoir, and an insight into many

aspects of farming life. Because the chapters are either written by Duncan (indicated by a horseshoe), or Carol (indicated by a native flower) the memoir is very diverse and will appeal to a wide audience.

Philippa Cameron used her Instagram page **@whats_for_smoko** as a platform to showcase her family's rural lifestyle on Ōtemātātā Station. Publisher Allen & Unwin realised that there was a huge interest in the reality of farming life and not just from rural readers. This resulted in her 2021 book, *A High Country Life*. Now she has published a follow-up: *Winter Warmers, recipes & stories from a New Zealand high country station*. In both books Philippa mixes tales from the farm with beautiful photos and recipes.

Salmon Mornay & Potato Wedge Pie

With the temperatures dropping, here is a



warming autumn dish, made easier with this "hack" of using frozen potato wedges. It is quick to prepare and perfect for these cooler nights.

50g butter 2 leeks, thinly sliced 1/4 c plain flour 2 ½ c milk Salt and pepper 2 t Dijon mustard 1 t finely grated lemon rind 500g boneless salmon ½ c frozen peas



2 T parsley leaves, finely chopped, plus extra, to serve 750g packet frozen potato wedges

- 1. Preheat oven to 220°C/200°C fan forced. Melt the butter in a frying pan over medium heat. Add the leek and cook, stirring, for 5 minutes or until softened and translucent but not coloured. Add the flour and cook, stirring, for 1 minute or until well combined. Remove from heat.
- 2. Gradually pour in the milk, stirring constantly, until well combined. Return pan to medium heat. Cook, stirring with a wooden spoon, for 5 minutes or until the sauce boils and thickens.
- 3. Add the mustard and lemon rind. Stir until combined. Add the salmon, peas and parsley. Stir until combined and coated.
- 4. Transfer the mixture to a 9-cup baking dish. Arrange the potato wedges, slightly overlapping, on top. Bake for 25-30 minutes or until the wedges are golden and cooked through. Sprinkle with salt and extra parsley to serve.

Safer Driving Course with Chris Thomas in Fairlie 19th May - Mackenzie Community Centre

We cannot stress enough, just how important it is to keep up to date with new rules and regulations and even just day to day driving strategies as we age. The very last thing we want to lose regarding our mobility, is the ability to drive in such a fashion that we don't endanger ourselves and others!

Here we must be honest and think about our driving capabilities! As we age we tend to forget the occasional rule or manner in which we drive, that could cause damage. Simple rules like what to do at a STOP sign! It does mean to completely stop behind the line and take notice before driving on. It is more than an 'oops' if we don't do this and wander off into the path of other vehicles. So too with driving in the correct position on the road. Certainly not hugging the centre line.

Fairlie produces a number of driving challenges in the form of

- ⇒ Parking outside the Fairlie Four Square, the reversing out is a fright especially if a big 4WD is obstructing your view. SOLUTION: Park where you don't have to back out around the corner.
- ⇒ Turning from Main Street onto Riddle Street

 be sure to be wearing your tolerance badge when you turn into this area, as many attempt to aim for the Fairlie Bakehouse but dither with a decision on what to do next, when they can't see a park.
 SOLUTION: that tolerant attitude.
- ⇒ The busy Main Street/ Talbot Road intersection with vehicles turning from Riddle Street onto Talbot, Talbot onto Main or crossing the road to School Road. This situation is not helped when vans and 4WD park outside Heartlands, totally obscuring your view of oncoming traffic. SOLUTION: Avoid the area altogether. We have seen so many 'near misses' by folk turning in front of those heavily laden logging trucks.

Our Wider District

The Evening Sky in May 2023

Venus is the 'evening star' setting in the northwest 2½ hours after the Sun. It is swinging out from the Sun as it catches up on Earth on the inside lane, so sets later. When the sky is dark, Mars appears above and right of Venus, looking like a medium brightness orange-red star. At midmonth Mars will be at the top of an equally spaced line with Castor and Pollux, the heads of Gemini the Twins. Mars holds its position night-to-night while the Twins slip slowly down the sky. The crescent Moon will be below Venus on the 23rd, between Venus and Mars on the 24th, and to the right of Mars on the 25th.

As the sky darkens **Sirius** appears midway down the western sky. It is the brightest of all the stars but much fainter than Venus. It twinkles with all colours when setting in the southwest around 11 pm. Sirius, 'the Dog Star', marks the head of **Canis Major** the big dog, now head down, tail up. **Canopus**, second brightest star, is southwest of overhead.

Below Sirius are bluish **Rigel** and reddish **Betelgeuse**, the brightest stars in **Orion**. Between them is a line of 3 stars, Orion's belt. To southern hemisphere star watchers, the line of 3 makes the bottom of 'The Pot', now on its side.

Southern Cross, Crux, is southeast of the zenith, to the right of 'The Pointers'. Alpha Centauri, the brighter Pointer, is the closest naked-eye star. Beta Centauri, like most of the stars in Crux, is a blue-giant star hundreds of times further away. Following the Milky Way down into the southeast finds Scorpius. Orange Antares marks the Scorpion's body. Its upside-down tail curves to the right of Antares. A scan along the Milky Way with binoculars shows many clusters of stars and some glowing gas clouds, particularly to the right of Southern Cross and in Scorpius. Orange Arcturus is the brightest star in the northern sky. It often twinkles red and green when low.

The Clouds of Magellan are two misty glows midway down the southern sky, easily seen by eye on a dark moonless night. They are small galaxies compared to our Milky Way Galaxy, close by as galaxies go.

Bright planets are in the morning sky. Saturn rises due east around 1 am, looking like a medium brightness cream -tinted star. It is north of the zenith at dawn. Golden Jupiter rises around 5 am and is the brightest 'star' in the dawn sky. Mercury first appears as a faintish (3rd magnitude) star below and right of Jupiter around 10th. It slowly climbs toward Jupiter and brightens. By 20th it is a medium-bright 'star' below and right of Jupiter. It continues to brighten but starts slipping lower after that. The Moon will be by Saturn on 14th, and near Jupiter and Mercury on 18th.

The full moon will look a little odd in the late morning hours on May 6th as it grazes the fuzzy edge of Earth's shadow. The Moon's bottom-right edge will be darkest around 5.30 a.m.

Tekapo Power Scheme - Autumn Community Update

Kia ora koutou,

We're now well into Autumn and it's time for an update with what's happening at the Tekapo Power Scheme.

Seasonal Changes - Autumn

What a mix of weather we've seen over the last few months. The significant rainfall event early in February saw 550mm in 3 days and raised the level of the Lake Tekapo by over 1 meter!

Currently, Lake Tekapo is approximately 709.5 meters above sea level, that's around 90% full. It is expected that the lake level will decrease coming into and throughout the colder months as demand for electricity increases to keep homes and businesses warm.

Community Open Day and Scheme Tours

On Saturday 11 March Genesis held our open day. The Tekapo Power Scheme plays a significant role in generating electricity for Aotearoa and it was our pleasure to open our doors and give our community the chance to see inside the stations and learn more about the scheme.

More than 80 people hopped on bus tours, looping from the town square, down to Tekapo A Power Station and along the Tekapo Canal to Tekapo B Power Station. Others engaged at our base in the town square, enjoying a free coffee or ice block, chatting with our team, and browsing through photos of the scheme's construction. We were able to introduce many people who were involved in the original construction of the stations or the canal.

Intake Safety Boom Replacement

You may have noticed the new floating boom in front of the Lake Tekapo Intake Structure indicating a public exclusion zone. This creates a safe area for users of the lake around the intake.

The boom was constructed and installed by our Genesis team, contractors and a specialist dive team in February. The project is not fully complete due to the high lake levels. To meet the resource consent conditions the onshore anchors are in a temporary location until the level of Lake Tekapo is lower. The onshore anchors will be moved to the lakebed and an additional six sections of boom will be added to each side of the floating structure.

Thank you to all who have contributed to the produce cupboard outside Heartlands. It's great to have a place where we can drop off surplus fruit and veg to share with our local community.


Please remember to bring a bag with you so many can share in the one box of produce or apples, which seems to be what is in plentiful supply at the moment!

ANZAC Day is a very special day for New Zealanders and Australians. I asked Lake Tekapo resident Jonny Izard if he would kindly share some memories from his travels in Turkey.



Here's his story:

I made a visit to the Gallipoli Peninsula in 1988 with a group of friends in an ageing VW Kombi. The visit had quite an effect on us after being on a high - having run with the Bulls in Pamplona, travelling across Western Europe and with the excitement of the upcoming Beer Festival in Munich on the radar.

We rolled into Çanakkale on 3 cylinders (a local mechanic diagnosed a faulty high tension lead by touching each wire by hand and receiving less of a shock from one!) sometime around mid August which was the off season as far as ANZAC celebrations went. Being easily identified as Kiwis by the look of our van we were being waved in by the tourist operators selling accommodation and tours of ANZAC Cove. The commercial side of the whole war history of the area is big business for the locals.

Being on a very limited budget, we decided to drive out to ANZAC Cove ourselves and independently visit the museums and cemeteries. So many of the places and geographical names were very familiar to us from what we had learned at school and from ANZAC Day readings over the years, so it was fascinating to put it all into context.

Reading the Ari Burnu Memorial attributed to Atatürk in 1934 really brought tears to the eyes (Google it) and the descriptions and photos of the battles in the museums were so interesting, along with some trenches either original or recreated, but fascinating all the same. We next drove down to the beach in ANZAC Cove where we set up camp for the night, as no one was around. Again, a really emotional time as we stood on the narrow flat area between the beach and the steeply rising hill trying to imagine the horrific scenes of the ANZAC's coming ashore and the Turkish forces with the advantage of height, that we have all heard so much about. Then looking up the coast a kilometre or two to the North and thinking why didn't they come ashore there, on the large flat area of land and how different the outcome could have been.

Sometime just prior to our visit to ANZAC Cove, a bulldozer had run its blade along the beach for some reason. It had exposed hundreds of bits of artillery shells and corroded clips of entire 303 type bullets amongst other things. We collected up a few bullets and found that the explosive material inside would still burn even after 70 or more years of being buried on a beach!

I have been back again since and strongly recommend any Kiwi travelling in that area to call in to pay your respects and feel the experience.





Supporting the food banks of our region

The Community Trust of Mid and South Canterbury is providing \$127,000 in funding to food cupboards and foodbanks in our region for this year and the same amount in each of the next two years. This will reduce the administration for the foodbanks and allow them to plan for the future.

The Community Trust supports 12 organisations across our region. Most groups use the funding to top up food parcels that they assemble from donated and rescued foods. Items such as fresh vegetables, meat, sanitary items and nappies can be included in parcels as need is identified. All these groups rely on volunteers to make up and distribute the food parcels. "Without this contribution every year, we couldn't stock the shelves and give out the amount of food we do to the community and other community." Liz Nolan, General Manager - Family Works, Timaru.

When people access Foodbanks not only are their food needs satisfied but organisations also assess other requirements the recipients may have whether immediate, such as heating, or strategic, such as budgeting advice or connection with education or employment support. The funding provided by the Community Trust will ensure that Foodbank organisations not only identify need but are able to also put in systems to resolve it.

Community Trust CEO Liz Shea says "We have been told by numerous Foodbanks that it is a common misconception that only homeless or unemployed people get food parcels. The main recipients now are families managing low incomes or those who are facing crises like job loss or unexpected medical or maintenance bills. The face of hunger across the motu is diverse, and the increase in the cost of living have seen more people facing hardship for the first time in our region."

The recipients are the St Mark's Foodbank Rakaia, the Salvation Army Ashburton, St Vincent de Paul Ashburton, St Andrew's Food Bank Geraldine, the Temuka Combined Churches Foodbank, Presbyterian Support SC, St Vincent de Paul Timaru, The Salvation Army Timaru, Salvation Army Waimate, Waimate Community Hub, Mackenzie District Enhancement Board and Foodbank Canterbury with a total distribution in 2023 of \$127,000.
