MATARIKI - 14 JUILY

The word "Matariki" is an abbreviation of "Ngā mata o te ariki o Tāwhirimātea", or "the eyes of the god Tāwhirimātea". Matariki was taken as a wife by Rehua (Antares) and she gave birth to eight children, each star having a unique purpose and defined role in ao Māori.

- Matariki (Alcyone): signifies reflection, hope, our connection to the environment, and the gathering of people. Matariki is also connected to the health and wellbeing of people.
- Pōhutukawa (Sterope/Asterope): connected to those who have passed on, especially those who have passed since the last rising of Matariki.
- Tupuānuku (Pleione): connected with everything that grows within the soil to be harvested or gathered for food.
- Tupuārangi (Atlas): connected with food from the sky or up in the trees – birds, fruits and berries.
- Waitī (Maia): connected to fresh water ecosystems.
- Waitā (Taygeta): associated with the ocean and the food sources within it.
- Waipunarangi (Electra): connected with the rain.
- Ururangi (Merope): connected with the winds.
- Hiwa-i-te-rangi (Celaeno): connected with granting our wishes and realising our aspirations for the coming year.

The celebration of Matariki is guided by three major principles:


- Remembrance honouring those we have lost since the last rising of Matariki.
- Celebrating the present gathering together to give thanks for what we have.
- Looking to the future looking forward to the promise of a new year.

Today, people all across Aotearoa New Zealand gather to celebrate Matariki. These gatherings are a time to mourn lost loved ones, share kai, and celebrate.

The Matariki constellation is significant to many other cultures worldwide. It is mentioned in the Koran, the Talmud, and the Bible, and is even featured in the 17,000 year old cave paintings in the Lascaux caves in France.

Are you ready for the Mackenzie Half Marathon?

Do you realise it's on this week? Saturday 15th July. YES! YES! YES! We are still taking registrations! Even with the online registrations closed, you can still come along on Friday afternoon or Saturday morning to register. You'll see the team at the Village Green this year inside the Hazlett Tent. And for those who have registered, don't forget to pick up your race packs. Friday is the best day between 3 pm and 6.30 pm.

Race up Spur Road in the 21.1km Half Marathon, and don't forget the wee dram of whisky to warm you up after the river crossing. Then get the kids involved in the 2.5km. Children under 5 are allowed to participate with a balance bike. And instead of drink stations there'll be lolly stations, so keep an eye out for that sugar boost to get back to the finish line. If you race around any of the events and cross the finish line wearing a kilt, you'll instantly win a prize. Then come along to the prize giving to see if you can win one of the amazing spot prizes. Central South Trail

The Central South Trail is a shared pathway which when completed, will take you from Caroline Bay through to Pleasant Point, Cave, Albury, Fairlie, Burkes Pass and Lake Tekapo. At just over 100ks long, the project has been in the making for the last three years. Currently the Washdyke to Pleasant Point section is completed, and the Fairlie to Kimbell Section is awaiting a ribbon cutting event in August. Later this year we plan to start construction on Lake Tekapo to Sawdon Station, and in the new year building will commence on the Cave to Pleasant Point trail. These trails are shared pathways so we encourage cyclists, walkers, runners, prams and mobility users to take advantage of the newly constructed sections.



Mid and South Canterbury Community Trust is the main sponsor of the Fairlie to Kimbell section and other sponsors are Paul Smith Earthmoving, Trust Aoraki, Robert Birks and Alpine Energy. We are grateful to Murray Bell, our local man on the ground and his team of supporters, ensuring all goes to plan. Waka Kotaki have provided significant ongoing support as have the Mackenzie and Timaru District Councils. Once finished, the trail will be a major tourism asset for the South Canterbury and Mackenzie Districts, helping attract both local and international visitors to the area. The Book Worm

GOING ZERO by Anthony McCarten Macmillan, \$37.99

Reading GOING ZERO is like binge watching ten episodes of a reality TV show, staying up late to find out if your favourite contestant is going to win. In the case of GOING ZERO, the reader will keep their fingers crossed for librarian Kaitlyn Day. The villain is billionaire tech mogul Cy Baxter who has teamed up




with the CIA to beta-test a ground-breaking piece of spyware named Fusion. Ten carefully selected contestants, 'Zeros', have been given two hours to go off the grid and 'Go Zero'. If they can evade detection by Fusion for 30 days, they will win three million dollars in cash. However, if all ten Zeros are captured in that period, Cy Baxter will win a 90-billion-dollar contract with the CIA. The CIA sees the collaboration with Cy's private company as an opportunity to broaden citizen surveillance without getting their hands dirty.

Some of the chapters are dedicated to each of the Zeros and the various spy technology the Fusion team uses to track them down. This includes the dubious (and hopefully fictional) 'Weeping Angel', a spyware installed in smart TVs that listens into conversations when the TV is presumed to be in off-mode. The last one standing is Kaitlyn Day. For Kaitlyn, the competition is about something much more important than winning the three million dollar cash prize.

The reader will slowly learn what drives Kaitlyn. And this moves the story beyond the competition and into the ethics of surveillance. Most of us are aware that social media mines our private data and that there are many surveillance cameras out there. But how much privacy are we willing to give up for the sake of national security? Where do we draw the line?

Learning about the threat to privacy does not stand in the way of the hours of enjoyment we get from this page turner. The short chapters increase the sense of urgency, but they also make the book very accessible. This book is way outside my usual reading realm, but it's going to be one of the most memorable ones.

The staff at the library can show you how to sign in, set up the simulator (including the Virtual Reality headset), and show you how to use the different features and settings of the simulator. It's a great piece of technology, so please come in and check it out. Don't worry - you DO NOT have to be tecnicallyminded to use the equipment.

To make your Matariki meal one to remember, Kasey and Karena Bird - celebrity chefs, award-winning authors and sisters - have partnered with Silver Fern Farms to create several recipes that are inspired by the constellation. The dynamic duo from Maketū, Bay of Plenty (who took out the title of *MasterChef NZ* in 2014) consulted the stars and put together three dishes featuring ingredients guided by Tupuānuku, Tupuārangi, Waitī and Waitā, centring around meaty, earthy flavours. Here's one of them to try ...

Mānuka Marinated Lamb Rumps with Kahawai Potato Puree

1 pack Silver Fern Farms Lamb Rumps

1 tbsp mānuka honey3 tbsp mint sauce1 tbsp olive oil3 tbsp mint sauce5 alt and pepper

Potato Puree:

4 agria potatoes 1/2 cup cream 100g kahawai, smoked Zest of 1 lemon

4 tbsp butter, room temperature Handful of chives, finely chopped Salt and pepper

Zesty sauce:

4 tbsp mint sauce 1 tsp wholegrain mustard 1 tbsp olive oil Fresh mint, to garish

- Preheat the oven to 180 degrees. Remove Silver Fern Farms Lamb Rumps from packaging, cover and bring to room temperature.
- Place all the ingredients for the marinade in a bowl, pat the lamb with a paper towel and add to the marinade. Allow to marinate for at least one hour. For best results, leave to marinate overnight.
- To cook, place the lamb in the oven and roast for 20 minutes for medium-rare. Remove from the oven and leave to rest for 10 minutes before slicing.
- To make the kahawai mash, peel and chop the potatoes into even pieces. Place the potatoes in a pot and add cold water until they are just covered. Generously season the water with salt.
- Place the pot on a medium-high heat and boil for 10 to 15 minutes or until tender and completely cooked. Once cooked, drain and mash well. Add in butter and mix thoroughly. Then add cream and stir through.
- Flake the smoked kahawai through the mash and gently stir through. Add lemon zest and chives and season to taste.
- To make the sauce, mix all of the ingredients together. Slice the lamb and spoon over the sauce, garnish with the fresh mint leaves and serve with the kahawai mash.

The following is taken from a beautiful Matariki booklet published by the Office for Maori Relations – Te Arawhiti and can be found online.

The three themes for Matariki are:

Remembrance - remembering those who have passed during the year.

Celebrating the Present - gathering to celebrate the present with feasting, games and joyful activities. **Looking to the future** - planning for the year ahead.

A series of karakia, 'incantations', to honour the rising of Matariki (a cluster of 9 stars) and to celebrate the New Year are spoken to Matariki in winter just before the sun rises. Matariki is the name of the entire star cluster as well as it's brightest star.

Firstly, a Waerea (protective incantation) seeks to clear space and people form any obstruction in order for the ceremony to proceed.

Pōhutukawa helps us remember those who have passed since the last rising of Matariki. It is at this time that people want to call out the names of loved ones who have died in the past year.

After the karakia to Pōhutukawa and the honouring of the dead, food is offered to the stars. The steam from the cooked food rises into the sky and feeds Matariki. Once this part of the ceremony has been completed, a series of karakia follow. The karakia are dedicated to the different stars in the cluster.

Tipuānuku is the star associated with food earth grown.

Tipuārangi means to grow in the sky, and this karakia reaffirms our connection to the forests and the birds.

Waitī is the star of lakes, rivers, streams and fresh water and acknowledges our strong connection to the bodies of fresh water.

Waitā is the star of salt water, and this karakia acknowledges our strong connection to the ocean.

Waipunarangi means 'water that pools in the sky', and this karakia speaks to the rain.

The star of the wind is **Ururangi**, and together with Waipunarangi, they are the stars connected to the weather.

Hiwa-i-te-rangi is the Māori wishing star and speaks to our hopes and desires for the year.

Matariki is the main star in the cluster. It is connected to wellbeing and welcomes in the New Year.

Meeting people in our community ...

Meet Emily Murray (Ems). Ems is married to Will and they have 3 children; Angus (17), Greta (14) and Ben (12). Glenmore Station is their home.

Where were you born and tell us about your child-hood?

I was born in Timaru. I am #3 of 4 girls. We grew up on a sheep farm near Timaru. Mum and Dad are still there – they are blessed



with good health. My Dad is 80 and they are still farming! The expectation from Dad was that we would all contribute to the farm. My sisters and I were driving tractors at age 10 and helping with all aspects of farmwork. Our childhood and upbringing was very simple and gorgeous. We each had ponies - school, farming and ponies were our world.

After I left school, I studied at Otago and Lincoln Universities, completing a PE Degree and a Business Management degree (with 1st class honours), specialising in Human Resources. My first job after university was working for Air NZ and looking after the wellbeing of the 2,000 engineers that were employed back in those days, in Christchurch and Auckland.

Would you like to share with us how you met your husband, Will?

Sure – I was in Tekapo one Queen's Birthday weekend with my friend and our horses. We were told that Glenmore was a good place to trek, and we met Will there. At that time, I had entered the Coast to Coast adventure race. Will decided that he would enter too (quite possibly as a reason to contact me and meet again). We trained together, developed a great friendship ... and the rest is history!

Tell us about your life at Glenmore Station and your work?

I'm a Farmer and a Mum - farming is our life. When I moved to Glenmore Station, I got a team of dogs together and joined the team. Glenmore is a merino, beef and deer farm with 14,000 stock units. The station is a fifteen minute drive up the western side of Lake Tekapo.

I also manage our business - Cass Valley Ski Touring. In 2012 we built our first alpine hut = Lady Emily Hut (named by my husband!) We now have 4 huts including the well-known 'Whiskey Hut', and 34 beds are available for skiers. I'm delighted that we are fully booked for this winter season.

Local Government

At the meeting this week,
Mackenzie District Councillors
voted to adopt the Annual Plan for 2023/24.



Chief Executive Angela Oosthuizen says 'This the third year of Mackenzie District Council's Long Term Plan and we are continuing on the direction set.

Inflation rates remain high and increasing interest rates are creating challenges for all New Zealanders. Council faces the same cost pressures, and our elected members and team have worked really hard to limit any further increases in rates. We budgeted on just over 2% inflation and so keeping our average rate increase of 10.2% which is slightly lower than what we had signalled in our Long Term Plan.

The plan focuses on actively progressing key projects:

- Completing the earthquake strengthening for the Fairlie Civic building and addressing fire risks to keep our team and public safe.
- Continuing to progress the review of the District Plan to enable our outdated District Plan to better respond to the effects of growth, bring it into line with national and regional planning instruments, and implement the newly created Mackenzie Spatial Plans.
- Capital costs of \$7,100,000 for the Twizel water meter installation project and the Fairlie water supply upgrade.
- Capital costs of \$940,000 for the Lake Tekapo wastewater treatment plant upgrade and district wide inlet screens.
- Investments in our public spaces:
 - Tekapo Domain and Lakeside Playgrounds in Tekapo
 - Lake front enhancement in Tekapo
 - Lake Ruataniwha project in Twizel
 - Continuing the Peace Avenue tree maintenance
 - * Fairlie Village Green development
- Community development is a new focus area and the plans sees us engaging with Tekapo, Twizel and Fairlie to identify the community needs and scope projects for inclusion in the next 10 year plan.
- Continuing to work with central agencies and organisations to address wilding pine spread in the Mackenzie.

In previous consultations our residents have told us that things like safe, well-maintained roads, good quality drinking water, and community facilities are important for our quality of life and environmental protection — so we're keeping our focus on these areas.

As a District this plan makes the right decisions for our people, our environment, and our future generations.

We want to strike the balance between planning responsibly for our community now and into the future, while working hard to keep rates as affordable as possible.'

Local Government

Lake Alexandrina Tree Works start 17 July

Water levels at Lake Alexandrina have been slowly rising over the last few years with the increase in willow root growth at the outlet, which has congested the creek, restricting water flow. As a result:

- Traditional crested grebe nesting sites around the lake have been flooded.
- Boat sheds and access points around the lake have been flooded.
- The bridge to the outlet huts has been placed at risk of washout during high rainfall events.

Following multi-agency discussions involving DOC, ECAN, Fish & Game, the Outlets Hut Holders Association, the Lake Alexandrina Conservation Trust and the Mackenzie District Council, it was decided to remove several willows immediately upstream of the bridge to the Outlet Huts to stop further root growth congesting the creek and to increase flow.


Significant biodiversity in the area mean that in-stream works cannot take place between April and November for trout spawning, and work on the trees cannot take place between August and March for nesting crested grebes.



To avoid disruption, tree removals will take place on the 17th July 2023 taking care to not disturb the creek and trout spawning. A second round of works will be completed in late March 2024 to remove the root mass and deepen the channel.

Wood suitable for firewood will be piled for the hut holders following the July works.

School Holiday - Nurturing Connection with God Amidst a Digital Age

Our Parish School, St Joseph's, concluded the second term with a period of silent Eucharistic adoration in the chapel on Friday morning, June 30th. The children were taught about the presence of Jesus in the Eucharist, and how He lovingly watches over each and every one of them. During the time of silence, the children were invited to share openly a special blessing they enjoyed the most during the term and an incident they regretted. This experience is meant to help our children foster their relationship with God and cultivate humility. Allowing the children with the opportunity to pray leads them to Jesus, their Lord and Shepherd, who guides them personally.

The Risen Lord understands that we live in a world that is heavily influenced by digital reality. 




