# Inspirational Challenges

#### Marathon des Sables Ultramarathon 2023

This race takes place every year in the western side of the Sahara desert in northern Africa. I travelled to Casablanca in Morocco to meet up with some fellow runners from Australia and NZ, and then we got on a bus and travelled 8 hours into



the desert, close to the Algerian border.

The race is on foot, self-supporting, six stages over seven days, covering roughly 250 kms. The Sahara desert has some big mountain ranges and huge flat wadis, you sink into the fine sand up to you knees sometimes, and then it's very rocky and steep climbing some of the passes.

With everything in my backpack (6 kg) that I needed for the week, I started running with 1,200 other people. The temperature was 39°C at 8.30 am and by 9.30 am it was 45°C. At mid-day it hit early 50°C and stayed there for the afternoon. A huge heatwave was covering northern Africa for the entire week we were there, making it the hottest temps ever experienced in the events 37 year history. Everybody was suffering from heat stress and the medics were kept very busy for the week. As the week progressed we had a lot of people pulled from the event with heat stroke.

The scenery running through the Sahara was amazing, especially early morning and on dusk with awesome sunsets, but the snakes and scorpions were a constant worry, with all the runners having to carry a venom pump to extract the poisons if you got bitten. Luckily I didn't, but some did.

As the week progressed I was going well, recovering from a dose of heat stroke on Day 2, I was having trouble holding down food in the extreme heat. The longest stage is on Day 4 and 5, and this was 85 kms over some huge sand dunes and wadis, with a couple of mountain passes as well. I was travelling well but got another bout of heat stroke and in the early hours of Day 5, I was pulled from the event, along with a big group of fellow competitors who were all suffering.

This was the right decision for me as I was 10 kg lighter than when I started. The event had over 40% of the runners pulled with a lot of people in hospital tents.

The event is classed by the National Geographic as one of the hardest foot races on the planet and it truly lived up to that reputation this April. *Grant Munro*

#### **Rocket Challenge**



## The Evening Sky in August 2023

**Venus** is the brilliant 'evening star' at the beginning of the month, setting around 7:30. It slips lower night-to-night as it moves between us and the Sun. By the 10<sup>th</sup> it is setting 40 minutes after the Sun. It disappears in the twilight soon after that (so isn't on the chart.) After passing between us and the Sun on the 13<sup>th</sup>, Venus appears in the eastern dawn sky. By the 20<sup>th</sup> it is rising an hour before the Sun.

Mercury makes its best evening sky appearance of the year in August. At the beginning of the month it is above and right of Venus, and is the second brightest 'star' in the western sky after Venus. At mid-month Mercury is setting due west two hours after the Sun. Mars is then above and right of Mercury, looking like a reddish star. Mercury sinks lower in the twilight in the second half of August as it moves between us and Sun. It also fades as more of its sunny side is turned away from us.

The Moon will be below Mercury and Mars on the 18<sup>th</sup> and above and right of Mars on the 19<sup>th</sup>.

**Saturn** rises due east before 8 pm at the beginning of the month. It looks like a medium bright star with a cream tint. By the end of the month it is up at dusk. Saturn's ring is visible in any telescope magnifying 20x or more. The Moon will be near Saturn on the night of August 2<sup>nd</sup> -3<sup>rd</sup> and again on the 30<sup>th</sup>-31<sup>st</sup>. At dawn Saturn is low in the western sky.

Bright stars are widely scattered over the sky. **Vega** on the north skyline is balanced by **Canopus** low in the south. Canopus twinkles with all colours as its white light is broken up by the air. So does Vega but, being fainter, it's not so obvious. Orange **Arcturus** is in the northwest, twinkling red and green as it sets. Canopus is the second brightest true star. (Sirius, the brightest star, is in the morning sky.) Arcturus is the fourth-brightest star in the sky and the brightest north of the celestial equator. Vega is the fifth brightest of all the stars and the second brightest north of the equator.

North of the zenith is orange Antares, marking the body of Scorpius. The Scorpion's tail hooks around the zenith like a back-to-front question mark. Antares and the tail make the 'fish-hook of Maui' in Māori star lore. Below or right of the Scorpion's tail is 'the teapot' made by the brightest stars of **Sagittarius**. It is upside down in our southern hemisphere view.

Midway down the southwest sky 'The Pointers', Beta and **Alpha Centauri**, point down and rightward to **Crux** the Southern Cross. Alpha Centauri is the third brightest star in the sky (planets not counted) and the closest of the naked eye stars.

Jupiter rises after 1 am at the beginning of the month, and before midnight at the end. It is the brightest 'star' in the morning sky till Venus appears. It shines with a steady golden light. The Moon will be near Jupiter on the morning of the 9<sup>th</sup>.

The **Milky Way** is brightest and broadest overhead in Scorpius and Sagittarius. In a dark sky it can be traced down past the Pointers and Crux into the southwest. To the northeast it passes Altair, meeting the skyline right of Vega. The Milky Way is our edgewise view of the galaxy, the pancake of billions of stars of which the sun is just one. Binoculars show many clusters of stars and some glowing gas clouds in the Milky Way.

The Large and Small Clouds of Magellan **LMC** and **SMC** look like two misty patches of light low in the south, easily seen by eye on a dark moonless night. They are galaxies like our Milky Way but much smaller.

We are so fortunate to have such a talented photographer in our town, who is also able to provide 1:1 Astro Photography Workshops for people who want to develop their skills further.

#### Shelf Refurb



#### WHAT I WISH PEOPLE KNEW ABOUT DEMENTIA,

#### from someone who knows

By Wendy Mitchell Bloomsbury, \$24.99

In July 2014, Wendy Mitchell was diagnosed with young-onset dementia at the age of 58. What I Wish People Knew About Dementia is her second book and is written in a



chatty, readable style with many anecdotes from her own life and from friends with dementia who she got to know after her diagnosis. The book is a compilation of strategies for people with dementia and for those supporting them.

The first thing Wendy Mitchell emphasizes is that dementia is about so much more than memory loss. In the first chapter she gives examples of how the disease affects her senses which changed her relationship with food. She does not enjoy the taste and texture of foods she used to like. The metallic clang of cutlery on plates have become too loud for her ears and leaves her anxious. She has lost the coordination required for eating with knife and fork. Tone and contrast are difficult to distinguish which means that a white plate with mashed potato or a thin piece of fish does not register as a plate with food. She could 'outwit' some problems by buying yellow plates (because there is not a lot of food that is yellow) and by using large pasta bowls to avoid pushing food over the edge of the plate. But she could not eat without shame until she reminded herself that there was no shame to having a disease inside her brain that was eating away at her abilities.

In one passage she describes that black is generally a bad colour for someone with dementia. Black mats by the door look like gaping great sinkholes in the ground. If she sees someone dressed in black, it looks like their head is floating in thin air. I remember an old gentleman with dementia pointing to a mat on the floor and telling me that we were on a boat that there was a hole. Finally, I understand him. This is the gift that Wendy Mitchell gave me. I can only imagine how much this book can mean for people with dementia and their supporters.

It's International Friendship Day on 30th July. What better excuse to hold a wintry pot luck dinner, and a good old family favourite recipe in our household in the 1980's was Dad's Meatballs ... and it still is! Leo Crampton was Chairman of

the Mackenzie Community Centre Project.

(Page 39 of the Mackenzie Muster)

#### Meatballs

1/4 c raisins 1 eqq 1/4 c tomato puree 1/2 t salt

500 g mince 1/2 c fresh breadcrumbs

1/4 t ground ginger 1 onion 1 beef oxo cube pepper

Mix all these ingredients and make into meatballs. Fry in oil. Place in casserole and pour sauce over meatballs. Bake at 180°C until sauce thickens.

#### Sauce:

3/4 c tomato puree 1 t prepared mustard

1/2 t ground ginger 1 T vinegar Worchester sauce 2 T brown sugar

1 c hot water

Mix all together and thicken with a little cornflour.

# Our Community

#### **Proposed Public Recreational Space**

This is an approximately 10 hectare, council-owned site between Monument and Stoneleigh Roads.

Recently, the council has clear-felled 3 ha. The harvest was forced by wind-felled trees. The site is not really suitable therefore, for commercial forestry.

This site also has a significant history for Kimbell and Fairlie. It was the burial site for Leila Georgeson (nee Hamilton) who died after childbirth in 1922. The gravesite is marked by a headstone, surrounded by a picket fence, still present on the hillside looking toward the Four Peaks range. Creating a recreational area is a way to protect and respect our settler's history and acknowledge the Hamilton family who invented the jet engine. They lived on the corner of Stoneleigh and Monument Road on Ashwick Station, close to the Opihi where a young boy dreamed of finding a way to propel a boat upstream in a river. From here the Hamilton Jet was born.



Our proposal is to replant the harvested area with a mix of exotic trees and natives on this historic site, using the existing logging tracks for walking, mountain biking or horse riding and creating a peaceful space from which to enjoy the nature and the spectacular views.

This is an initiative that, if supported by the community, the council is likely to back.

This is a great time to do this as the site is now clear of pines and needs tidying up. The cost of reforestation in pines, which are at risk of blowing down again, could instead be used for the right exotics and natives that are suitable for the site, creating a colourful autumn sanctuary. A parking area already exists which could be enhanced with picnic tables and fruit trees.

The site is also easily accessible from the river track and new Central South cycle track that runs from Fairlie to Kimbell so far, and which will run past Stoneleigh Road.

#### Coping with Change



Below is a note from Alison Brierly and Brian Ellis who are currently travelling in Europe on their tandem bike.

We flew with our our bike and trailer to Madrid, spending a few days in the city, putting the bike together and figuring out our route. There was an interesting reaction when, after arriving with boxes and bags at our hostel, a few days later we manoeuvred a tandem and trailer down 4 flights of stairs. This was the start of our adventures!

We have a tent, camping gear and a small gas cooker with us. Our aim was to camp and cook our own food to keep our costs down. Having a small espresso maker with us also, has at times saved our day!

Over the 3 months we cycled 6,000 kilometres through Portugal, Spain and France. We also spent a week in Morocco, resting our knees and exploring Tangier. Every day brought new sights, conversations, challenges and memories. The timing was perfect to enjoy endless days of fine weather, being 5 weeks before we needed a raincoat! However, we know that there will always be some "weather" on a long trip, and sure enough, crossing the Pyrenees was when we hit our first storm. This made the mountain crossing exciting, if not a bit dangerous, as the wind tried to blow us off the bike!

I could write a book just about our camping experiences! We know not to expect many amenities other than a shower and toilet throughout most of the European campsites. Even a picnic table is a luxury! Although there are many "resort" campsites, paying a higher price for a pool that was often closed, a bar and restaurant and "entertainment" was not what we wanted. In one campsite we were offered a stony place to pitch our tent because apparently it was not "tenting" season yet and the tent area wasn't open. We convinced them that we were "tenting" and they made a couple of phone calls and we were allowed a softer place for the tent.



We have met amazing people also cycling long routes, some with young families who are cycling for months on end. Sharing information and tips on routes, campsites etc is another enjoyable aspect of our trip. We joined a tandem rally in France, enjoying the company of 80 or more tandem riding enthusiasts.

The weather, the landscape, the community. We always thought we would move when our girls left home, we haven't found anywhere better yet!



# Tekapo Power Scheme - Winter Community Update

Kia ora,

As we are well into winter, we have another community update from the team at the Tekapo Power Scheme.

#### Seasonal Changes - Winter

Currently, Lake Tekapo is approximately 708.05 meters above sea level, around 66% full for this time of year. The cold weather across the South Island over the last few weeks has increased electricity demand so the Scheme has been operating at near full capacity to keep people warm!

#### Twizel Area School - Year 10 tour

In May we had the pleasure of hosting the year 10 students from Twizel Area School at the Tekapo Power Scheme. The students got practical (and a little muddy) by building mini earth dams, being a "human energy generator" and having a spaghetti and marshmallow tower building competition!

#### **Genesis' Resource Consent Application**

In July, we submitted a resource consent application to the Canterbury Regional Council to authorise the continued operation of the Tekapo Power Scheme. We have been preparing the application for the past few years, so to reach this point is a significant milestone.

Hydro generation, such as that provided by the Tekapo Power Scheme, is of great importance due to the dual benefits of being renewable and having significant water storage so that generation is available when needed, both of which will be increasingly important as New Zealand decarbonises its economy.

The Tekapo Power Scheme contributes enough renewable electricity to power about 120,000 homes, and what's more, the water that passes through the Tekapo Power Scheme (including Tekapo A and B Power Stations) is then used to generate electricity through a further six power stations owned by Meridian. With this in mind, the Tekapo Power Scheme is a pretty important piece of infrastructure.

The consent application seeks to replace the current resource consents granted in 1990 that enable the core operations of the scheme, and which are due to expire in 2025. We are not proposing any material changes to the current operational parameters apart from an adjustment to the flood operating rules required for the safety and integrity of the scheme.

In preparing the consent application we undertook science covering a range of disciplines to better understand the environment in which we operate. We also spoke regularly to mana whenua, the Tekapo community, and interested parties, and developed a range of proposed outcomes to ensure we appropriately manage the effects of our operations on people and the environment.

The Canterbury Regional Council's consent process includes the opportunity for members of the public to participate. Once Environment Canterbury has completed its initial checks of Genesis' application, Environment Canterbury will publish it on their website and outline the process for making a submission.

#### Mackenzie District Plan Review

Stage Three: Rural Areas



Mackenzie District Council is updating the Mackenzie District Plan to ensure the district can grow in a sustainable way, while protecting the things that make the place so special.

The Mackenzie District Plan Review began in early 2022 and is continuing to make great progress, with the first two stages complete.

Earlier this year in March, council consulted with the community on a range of issues involved in Stage Three, which covers the rural parts of the district.

The District Plan Review team used the results of this phase of consultation to help shape up a range of Plan Changes based on feedback. Stage Three is now well underway, and MDC is looking to notify the below Plan Changes in November, subject to Council approval.

- Plan Change 23 Rural and Natural Environment
- Plan Change 24 Sites and Areas of Significance to Māori
- Plan Change 25 Rural Lifestyle Zones
- Plan Change 26 Energy and Infrastructure
- Plan Change 27 Subdivision, Earthworks and Transport

#### Have your say

We are just about to kick off a second round of community consultation on Stage Three As part of this we will be carrying out a survey which seeks to understand what people think about the above plan changes. We'll be using the feedback we receive to help fine tune the provisions before taking them to Council for adoption and notification. This survey will be live online at letstalk.mackenzie.govt.nz > DPR Stage 3 from 26 July - 20 August.




