Community Supports Revegetation

Opihi River Revegetation Project members have discovered that many hands make light work.

Having planted 2,075 trees along the Talbot Road section of the Opihi River walkway, they have just under 3000 left to go.

Organiser Lisa North said the 5,000 native trees would be planted along the river from the Allandale Bridge to the gorge. "So it is a big project." When she had first seen the state of the track, it made her cry going along there. "It was all weeds," she said. She was fortunate to work at the Fairlie Resource Centre, as it offered her the ability to do something about it, she said.

She felt the plantings would complement the track, which was made and maintained by the Fairlie Lions Club.

The project has been helped along by a few organisations. Environment Canterbury's (ECAN) Waitaha Action to Impact Fund made up the bulk of the funding and Opuha Water Ltd supplied the cardboard tree guards and materials for a trapping library.



Fairlie's newly established Menzshed was constructing those materials into traps. "It's their first project."

Ms North received a lot of information on what should be planted. She had spoken to an entomologist, who had told her that a lot of the area would have been grassy plains where moa roamed. He told her there would have been abundant native insects and butterflies, she said.

She had chosen plants that would draw insects, like the Muehlenbeckia australis, which brought in the butterflies and kowhai to attract the birds.

She had been provided with a list from an ECAN biologist with native plants which were suited to the area. Some farmers had been surprised to see matagouri planted in the midst of the trees. "Birds nest in there for protection."



The project had the help of Mackenzie College through its enviro club. The club's founding members, Phoebe Wilson and Lucas Lanchester, were both interested in the cause for different reasons.

Ms North said year 9 pupil Phoebe was a "budding entomologist" who had a host of favorite trees, one of which was the kowhai.

Year 7 pupil Lucas used the track with his mum for mountain biking at the weekends.

Mackenzie College enviro school lead Jess King had just started at Mackenzie College this term.

Ms King said while it might not seem like much now, when the children grew up and were going out the – potentially with their own children- they would "see the difference." Her own children (18 months old and 3 years) would actually see the trees grow with them, she said.



Lions Clubs New Zealand Heads Up for Kids project provides a helping hand for young people to engage in an experience or activity that will enable them to live their dream, establish life goals and reach their full potential within their chosen field.

Donate old New Zealand & foreign currency and support Kiwi kids

Launched in July 2010, Heads Up for Kids is a unique collection which asks New Zealanders to dig out and donate old decimal and pre-decimal New Zealand currency, and all foreign money. The obsolete cash is then redeemed for New Zealand dollars and used to fund education programmes for young New Zealanders who would otherwise not get the opportunity.


Because the obsolete currency is no longer legal tender, and foreign coins cannot be exchanged in this country, the project is not in competition with other fundraising dollars.

Many young people have already benefited from Heads Up for Kids, receiving scholarships to organisations such as Spirit of Adventure and Hillary Outdoor Pursuits

Centres. To date Lions have collected over 28.8 tonnes of coins and thousands of banknotes (that's the equivalent weight of 4 elephants, 460 cattle or 6450 cats!) bringing the total raised close to \$612,000. The Reserve Bank of New Zealand estimates that there is \$80 million in old decimal and pre-decimal NZ coins and \$20 million in old banknotes unaccounted for. There are plenty more coins still out there and Lions Clubs of New Zealand are hoping to collect \$1 million.

Copper trails, brass razoos and gold sovereigns are all part of the Lions Clubs of New Zealand's unusual campaign Heads Up for Kids.





THE COVENANT OF WATER by Abraham Verghese Grove Press, \$37.99

The Covenant of Water by Abraham Verghese is a big book of 736 pages set in India and spanning from 1900 to 1977. It follows three generations of a family and starts when a 12-year-old girl is to marry a 40-year-old widower. Big



Ammachi, as the girl and future matriarch of Parambil will come to be known, holds the narrative together through the seven decades. The saga is set against the background of the caste system, the colonised and later independent India and the scenery and geography of Southern India. But it is the people and their dramas and dreams that propel the story forward.

Parallel to Big Ammachi's storyline we also follow a medical doctor from Scotland, Digby Kilgour and another doctor from Sweden, Rune Orquist. Verghese who was born in Egypt to Indian parents is a physician and the book features some very detailed descriptions of medical conditions and operations. Verghese understands that even when a disease cannot be cured, the person with the disease can be healed, and you feel this throughout the book, especially in the leper colony set up by Rune.

What makes this story very special for me is the tenderness with which the author has imbued the characters in this book. Despite the personal tragedies and the major political events, you feel there is hope for humanity because of the kindness in people.

Here is an admission: I didn't read the 736 pages, I listened to it as an audiobook narrated by the author himself. It is the most beautiful audiobook I have ever listened to. The Indian lilt of the author's voice and the slow, deliberate way in which he read the story transported me to the world far away from my own.

A little sidenote for those unfamiliar with audiobooks: Most audiobooks are now in digital form and you can borrow them from the library or buy them from Libro.fm. Audiobook platform Libro.fm is new to the New Zealand market and (unlike the Amazon owned Audible) they share profits from audio purchases with your chosen bookstore. *Wilma*



Emergency Services

Caution urged with controlled burns

Fire and Emergency is urging people to remain vigilant when they're burning off paddocks and vegetation with high winds forecast across the country.

A restricted fire season has already been declared for the Upper Waitaki and Central fire zones of Otago, with fire permits suspended for those areas until Sunday at 8 am due to very high fire danger.

In the last 30 days in Hawke's Bay, there have been 13 fires caused by controlled or previous burns. Earlier this week in Canterbury, a controlled burn spread to a boundary hedge and then set fire to the roof of a house. There have also been fires started by controlled or previous burns in Southland and Mid-South Canterbury recently.

Fire and Emergency acting Service Delivery Wildfire Manager Rachael Thorp says people should exercise caution when completing a burn. "Ensure you check the weather conditions before you burn and if you're in any doubt, then hold off until more favourable conditions are present. If you've already completed a burn, we urge you to continue to check it as the chance of reignition is high. It's important to remember burying embers under dirt may not extinguish the fire. Especially with the high winds predicted this weekend, this can disturb the soil, pick the embers up and carry them in the win to other ignition sources."

People should also exercise caution when lighting any bonfires or rubbish fires. Check the weather and don't burn if the conditions are windy or hot.

While fire season changes are yet to take place for most of the country, people should not allow an open fire season to make them complacent, Rachael Thorp says. "Every fire comes with risk. For fire safety tips, and to check the fire danger in your area, go to




A few weeks ago, a green and black coloured jetsprint boat was stolen from a Fairlie address and has not been recovered at this stage.

Let's make it as hard as possible for them and keep things locked up with keys removed and valuables out of sight at any time of the day.



Fairlie Spring Flower Show

Remember to pick some of your favorite flowers and enter them into the Fairlie Spring Flower Show. Don't worry if your daffodils have wilted and your tulips aren't flowering yet...it's the community spirit that blossoms, we can just go with 3 blooms of whatever and then we can eat cake!

Potatoes (Solanaceae family – includes tomatoes, chillies, egg-plant and capsicums)
If you only have a small vegie plot, then a fun idea for growing potatoes is to plant them in a tower. The tower can be made of wire mesh or an old basket. Place the seed potatoes on the ground and then pile straw (old, rotten



straw is best) on top. The potatoes come out clean and the tower can be shifted around the garden for the next planting. You probably won't get any more potatoes from growing in a tower as opposed to growing in the ground, but it's great for the kids to try and they love the harvest time, hunting through the straw.

Aoraki Mackenzie International Dark Sky Reserve

Mackenzie District Council Lighting Plan Changes

There's been a major step forward for our reserve as the Mackenzie District Council has reviewed its District Plan section on light. The aim of the changes are to ensure the integrity of the night environment is protected through thoughtful and only necessary lighting. Some simple steps can make all the difference when installing and using lighting. These steps are:

- Only use light when you need it.
- Only use the amount of light that is needed.
- Shield and direct the light so it shines downward and only lights the area it needs to.
- Use warm-coloured light (yellow/amber) the warmer the better.

The rules to achieve this are included in the Council's District Plan and now include using a covering to stop light spilling out from skylights. You can see the plan on the council's website here: www.mackenzie.govt.nz/rates-building-and-property/lighting-and-the-aoraki-dark-sky-reserve

Protecting our Reserve

We are so lucky to live in a Dark Sky Reserve! How amazing it is to simply step outside and admire the beautiful Milky Way, a sight that approximately one third of the world can't see due to light pollution. DarkSky International notes in their annual report on artificial lighting that "there is evidence of significant harm to the night sky and wildlife ecology from light pollution on local to global scales."

Light pollution is increasing in our region, and we must be vigilant or we could lose not only our Dark Sky Reserve status but also our ability to gaze upon pure and dark night skies.

You can help protect the Reserve by applying for our Dark Sky Friendly Scheme. It's available to businesses and private homes in the Mackenzie Region, to help our amazing dark skies as well as ensure the wellbeing of our people, flora, and fauna.

To apply, you'll need to state how closely your home or business complies with the seven clauses of the Dark Sky Friendly Charter, as well as list all exterior lights on the property. Compliance with most of the clauses is required, as well as a lighting plan to improve any shortcomings, however, the AMIDSR board will offer friendly and helpful guidance.

Public Notices

The Evening Sky in October 2023

The brightest stars are low in the north and south. Canopus is low in the southeast at dusk, often twinkling colourfully. It swings up into the eastern sky during the night. On the north skyline is Vega, setting in the early evening.

Saturn appears northeast of the zenith. It has a cream colour, unlike any star. It is at one end of a widely spaced line of stars going southward across the sky and down to Canopus. The star Fomalhaut, to the right of Saturn, marks the Southern Fish. Below and right of Fomalhaut is Achernar, the same brightness as Saturn. The line continues down the sky to Canopus.

Jupiter is a late 'evening star' at the beginning of the month, rising around 10:20. It is the brightest 'star' in the night sky, shining with a steady golden light. It rises four minutes earlier each night. By the end of the month it is up at dusk. At dawn it is in the northwest sky but then the second brightest 'star' after Venus (see below.) The Moon will be near Jupiter on the 1st and 2nd and again on the 28th and 29th.

Orange Antares is midway down the western sky. It marks the body of the Scorpion. The Scorpion's tail loops up the sky, making a back-to-front question mark with Antares being the dot. The curved tail is the 'fish-hook of Maui' in some Māori star lore. Above and right of the Scorpion's tail is 'the teapot' made by the brightest stars of Sagittarius. It is upside down in our southern hemisphere view.

In the southwest are 'The Pointers', making a vertical pair. They point down to Crux the Southern Cross. Alpha Centauri, the top Pointer, is the closest naked eye star.

The Milky Way is brightest and broadest in Scorpius and Sagittarius. In a dark sky it can be traced down to the south. In the north it meets the skyline right of Vega. The Milky Way is our edgewise view of the galaxy, the pancake of billions of stars of which the Sun is just one. The actual centre, with a black hole four million times the sun's mass, is hidden by dust clouds in space. Its direction is a little outside the Teapot's spout. The dust clouds appear as gaps and slots in the Milky Way. A scan along the Milky Way with binoculars shows many clusters of stars and some glowing clouds of left-over gas. There are many in Scorpius and Sagittarius and in the Carina region below Crux.

On moonless evenings in a dark rural sky the Zodiacal Light is visible in the west. It looks like late twilight: a faint broad column of light reaching up toward Antares, fading out at the Milky Way. It is sunlight reflecting off meteoric dust in the plane of the solar system. The dust may have come from a big comet, centuries ago.

Venus is the 'morning star', rising two hours before the Sun all month. It is brighter than Jupiter and silver- white in colour. The Moon will be below Venus on the 11th.


