Opening of the Hamilton Jet Display at the Fairlie Heritage Museum

After two years of research and hours of planning, the Fairlie Museum recently opened a display in memory of CWF (Bill) Hamilton who was born at Ashwick Station near Fairlie in 1899, and who was the first to successfully design the process of water jet propulsion, in particular jet units for jet boats.

The opening of the Hamilton Display in the Fairlie Heritage Museum coincided with the Annual Conference of the Jet Boat Association which was formed in 1968, and is the biggest boating club in New Zealand, The Annual Conference was held in Timaru . The Fairlie Museum's celebration was fortunate to have both Mike Hamilton and Mayor Anne Munro in attendance to open the display and address the conference delegates and Museum Committee. Mike Hamilton is CWF Hamilton's grandson and Chairman of Directors of CWF HamiltonJet, the factory in Christchurch where 1200 water jets are made annually and exported through 50 distributors around the world. The museum was also proud to have on display, a replica of the first water jet propelled boat (called Saucy Jane) and which is pictured below. This was the first boat in the world to negotiate up the swift flowing Ohau River and driven by CWF (Bill) Hamilton

The display puts an emphasis on CWF Hamilton's amazing ability to invest and manufacture earth moving equipment in a rural workshop, even though he'd had no formal engineering training, and who rose to head one of our largest engineering factories in New Zealand (presently employing 300 staff).



The Hamilton Display was compiled by Peter Foote and partner Jan Danrell. So, to learn about this incredible Fairlie man a visit to the Fairlie Heritage Museum is a must!

Also on display is the interesting story of Rodolph Wigley and his son Harry Wigley who were born in Fairlie and who developed the Mt Cook Company, which began by offering travel from Fairlie to Mt Cook and the Alps in 1906 and then grew exponentially to cover tourism to every destination in New Zealand by road and by air.







The Book Worm

MURRAY BALL, A Cartoonist's Life Mason Ball, Harper Collins, \$45

I have only just managed to get my hands on a copy of Murray Ball, A Cartoonist's Life, but I already feel qualified to tell you that it is a beautiful book. The front cover



of this hardback features a glorious photo of Murray Ball and his dog Finn, the inspiration for Dog. And while flicking through the pages I have to stop often to look at the photos, cartoon drawings and letters that the author has included to illustrate the story of the man behind one of New Zealand's most popular cartoons, Footrot Flats.

Mason Ball, Murray's son, decided to write this book after his father's death in 2017. He wanted the book to represent Murray Ball as more than just the creator of Footrot Flats. In this book he shares the real-life backstory to Murray Ball's most iconic characters and themes, and the story of the man/father who could see the quirks of human nature and capture them with the stroke of a pen.

While waiting for copies of the biography, I did some research by re-reading some of the Footrot Flats books (yes, it's hard work being a bookseller) in our private library (you can only find them second hand now). On the first page of Footrot Flats 5 Mason Ball, aged 14, has written a short 'biography' of Murray Ball. It seems that Mason's opinion of his father has not shifted much in over forty years. He saw him then as a hardworking, dedicated family man, who could be very opiniated but fair. The young Mason writes: 'He is far from a Saint but if I grew up to be like him, I wouldn't be doing too badly'.

I am curious to see if Mason, now aged 57, feels that he has done his father proud. On Thursday 23rd November, Mason is coming to Lake Tekapo, and he will talk to us in the Community Hall. It's a free event, so grab a few friends and BYO drink, and let's honour Murray Ball, the man who brought us these unforgettable characters through his cartoons.



Fire and Emergency launches project to reduce Twizel's risk from wildfire

Wildfire is a permanent natural hazard in much of the Mackenzie Basin, and Twizel locals are being encouraged to take simple steps around their property to reduce their own risk.

Fire and Emergency NZ has begun a campaign to help residents in the town, on lifestyle blocks and surrounding farms understand the risks and what they can do.

A community meeting and information session on Saturday 18 November offers locals the chance to ask questions and get advice relevant to their own homes and property.

Mid-South Canterbury District Manager Rob Hands says that the recent fire at Pukaki Downs was a very timely reminder of the ever-present risk. While the town of Twizel itself wasn't threatened by that fire, several properties within a few kilometres had to be evacuated and the highway to Mount Cook was closed for an extended period while firefighters and helicopters with monsoon buckets fought to contain and put out the fire. And just three years ago, the neighbouring community of Lake Ōhau evacuated safely but lost 48 homes and structures to a wildfire, which burned more than 5000 hectares.

"Most people in Twizel know that fire is always a risk in their area, but they don't necessarily know what they can do to reduce that risk," Rob Hands says. "We're aiming to change that and get people to act now."

Last year Fire and Emergency partnered with the Mackenzie District Council, Department of Conservation and Environment Canterbury in a project to reduce the Lake Tekapo Community's vulnerability to wildfire. This year it's Twizel's turn.

The projects are both based on detailed studies of the local terrain, climate and vegetation, which all contribute to the level of risk from wildfire. The studies identified areas of greatest risk to people and property, along with actions that landowners and residents could take to reduce the level of threat.

That includes the Councils and DoC taking steps to remove, thin or prune trees and bushes on reserves and other publicly owned land, maintain access and escape routes and keep grass short where possible.

On Friday 3rd of November, the Year 7 and 8 students of Mackenzie College got the amazing opportunity to visit Lake Opuha. On this trip the students helped Opuha Water Limited plant a variety of native trees and bushes. The project was focused on improving Lake Opuha biodiversity values, through enhancement of the main recreational area. The plants consist of: Harakeke (NZ flax), Ti Kouka (cabbage tree), Mingimingi (tree daisy) and Manuka. This project was created in association with the Upper Opihi-Opuha Catchment Group, Opuha Water Limited, and the Catchments Collective South Canterbury. The goals of the project are to improve the water quality and create habitat for the native birds and insects by reducing erosion of the lake shore and catching nutrients from runoff from the higher surrounding ground.

A number of local Community members volunteered to help. Ines Stager, a local expert who helped design the planting plan and Hannah Duncan from Opuha Water Limited who planned the project lead the day. The project was funded from Fonterra's Hapouri Programme. Fairlie Kindergarten mums supplied some delicious kai. Mackenzie College Year 7 and 8 students are currently doing a botany unit in science and this project tied into their classroom learning for this unit. Year 8 student Xavier Story said, "The planting was a great experience" and he would "Love to come back one day in the future to see how the biodiversity enhancement has grown."

The plants were propagated by Arowhenua Nursery and their staff helped and gave guidance to the volunteers on the day; they also prepared the site for planting.

The 7th of November marked the 25th anniversary of the official opening of the Opuha Dam. The dam itself is owned and operated by Opuha Water Limited. The dam is a 50 metre high earth dam with a single hydro turbine and can hold 74 million cubic metres of water. Lake

Opuha was created for water augmentation (the damming of water to save and use throughout the season). The dam allows water to be saved and used for environmental flows in the river, irrigation and also generates power as it is released from the dam. Lake Opuha also provides an amazing recreational area to our local community and visitors. Activities include swimming, boating, fishing, camping, walking and picnic areas.

On 3 November, the local Opihi Opuha Catchment Group and 60 students from Mackenzie College, with the help of Arowhenua Nursery staff and Landscape Architect Ines Stäger, planted 500 plants near the Lake Opuha Bennetts Road Reserve.

The project is part of a larger concept to revegetate Lake Opuha Island and the margins of the lake, where appropriate, with native, eco-sourced plant species. The aim of the project is to link new planting with existing remnant native vegetation and facilitate further linkages on farmland within the Opuha Catchment. In the long term, this would result in a network of continuous native wildlife corridors that would enhance the biodiversity values within the catchment and improve landscape values.

The natives species were planted in an area covered by grey and cracked willows, which will provide protection to the plants while they grow. Eventually, it is intended to



remove the willows and replace them with ecosourced native plants where appropriate.

Tekapo Power Scheme – Spring Community Update

Kia ora,

As we are well into spring, we have another community update from the team at the Tekapo Power Scheme.

Seasonal Changes - Spring

Currently, Lake Tekapo is approximately 705.7 metres above sea level and around 47% full. This is 84% of the long term average for this time of year. In the coming months, a combination of the expected increase in westerly winds as well as an El Nino weather pattern has the potential to increase lake inflows and levels.

Lake Tekapo Intake Safety Boom

In September, a project to upgrade and replace the old Lake Tekapo Intake Boom was completed. The old boom has now been replaced with a more rigid boom and a new anchor system. As fluctuating flows can occur around the Lake Tekapo Intake, a Safety Boom is essential to provide a physical barrier and exclude recreational users from the immediate area surrounding the Lake Tekapo Intake. The new boom significantly increases the visibility of the Intake area, and also provides recreational users with an opportunity to access the shoreline safely if they come too close to the Intake.

Wilding Tree Removal

We have begun removing wilding conifers near the Tekapo A Power Station end of the Tekapo Power Scheme. We are undertaking this work in collaboration with our neighbours to achieve a coordinated approach to wilding pine management in the area. We are also removing the trees behind the Tekapo A Power Station, with this work due to be completed in November. These works will take Genesis one step closer

to our goal of removing all wilding pines on Genesis land associated with the Tekapo Power Scheme.

Genesis' Resource Consent Application Update

In July, we submitted a resource consent application to the Canterbury Regional Council to authorise the continued operation of the Tekapo Power Scheme. The successful reconsenting of the scheme is an important component of New Zealand's energy security and achieving the country's decarbonisation commitments and aspirations. Genesis is seeking the same operational flexibility as the scheme has currently.

Environment Canterbury has recently completed their initial checks of Genesis' application, and it is now able to be viewed on the Environment Canterbury website. The application process will include the opportunity for the public to make submissions on the application. Environment Canterbury will notify the public when submissions open.

Tekapo Power Scheme 2023 Community Meeting

Genesis will host our annual Tekapo Power Scheme 2023 Community Meeting on Wednesday 29 November, from 6pm at Peppers Bluewater Resort. The purpose of this meeting is to provide an update on the previous year's compliance, and current and upcoming maintenance and project activities. 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
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
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
