Central South Island Charity Bike Ride 2024

The Central South Island Charity Bike Ride
is one of the region's largest community fundraisers. The
Charity Bike Ride began in 2005, and over the years \$2.3m
has been dispersed to South Canterbury organisations.
The commitment and determination from this group of
people continues to be a humbling experience for all.
Although the overall aim of the event is to raise monies
for small local charities, there has also been a positive spin
off for individuals and local communities.

The annual event took place last weekend 22-24 February - 20th year. The 365 km ride saw the cyclists make their way from Timaru through to an overnight stopover in Tekapo, through Kurow the next morning and then back to Timaru.

The 2024 Charities are Hospice South Canterbury; Family Works; Learning for U; Life Education Mid & South Canterbury; Multiple Sclerosis South Canterbury; Riding for the Disabled Timaru; YMCA; and a new charity in Mōkihi Hauora which is an organisation that's involved supporting people with mental health and addiction.

Education

Cannington School - Greetings from high on the hill here in Cannington!

Swimming

This year we have improved lots in our swimming. We practice every day, rain, hail or shine, that's because our teachers are slightly on the evil side. Our training regime is, get in, then start straight into 20 laps of the pool. Almost all of our five year olds already know how to swim a whole five lengths without touching the bottom of the pool! There is no time to wonder if the water is warm or cold. We think our faeries must look after the pool and us, because the water is usually warm.

Planting

One week ago, we did some school planting. Usually we plant beside rivers or creeks, but this time we planted at our school. We have started in one bushy area and are going to keep planting until we have planted the whole perimeter of the school. We planted some tussocks from Mr P's garden. We also used some of the plants from our school nursery. We have got cabbage trees, flaxes and grasses in our nursery. We think, this time next year, you won't recognize our school.

South Canterbury Model Aeroplane Club

On Wednesday 14th February we went to the Pleasant Point Model Plane aerodrome. Club members came to show us some of their model planes. Don, one of the flyers set up a flight simulator for us all to have a go with. Then he got out one of the model planes; a bi-plane. He started to fly it, and all was going well, until he got sun-strike and couldn't see the plane. Suddenly the plane changed direction, went straight to the ground and crashed! Luckily the only injuries were to the plane, and bit of Don's pride. The next day when we were back at school, we all wrote acrostic poems about planes. Here is the one Ayla wrote.

Model planes, getting ready to fly in the sky Or ready to land on the grass runway.

Doing cool tricks like spinning and

Even donuts; maybe

Loopty loops in midair. The ground

Pilots controlling the plane worried as the air craft

Lands, hoping that it won't crash! Oh no!A plane has crashed! Pilot error! Luckily it was a foam one!

Now, the pilots launch another cool plane **E**veryone

Stares as it takes off into the sun-strike glare.

Balloon Helicopters

The other day we tried to fly kites, but it was not windy enough! So, we got out these things called balloon helicopters. Balloon helicopters come in a small kit which includes two balloons, three propeller blades and a small rotor with a whistle and a balloon holder. This is how they work: first, you must put it together by fitting the propellers into the rotor. Then you get one balloon and blow it up and connect it to the rotor with the balloon holder. It's really tricky to do! Once you have it ready, you let it go. Miraculously it takes to the sky, flying and whistling! We learnt that if the whistle comes out, you can make a repair using a coiled up piece of paper, which results in the helicopter being able to go up higher. We think this is because more air is forced into the propellers.

Parachutes

On Thursday we made mini parachutes out of rubbish bags, plastic bags, string, weights and paper clips. Then we carried out experiments. We were in three teams. Each team went to a different part of the playground, and we had to throw them off the top of the playground towers to see which weight was slower and which one was faster. We learnt all about terminal velocity, acceleration and gravity with parachutes. We have also carried out similar experiments with paper propellors. This time we made modifications and looked for the changes these made to the way the propeller flew. Yesterday we made two different kinds of paper planes. We did test flights to see the difference between the planes, and to see the effect of thrust in getting them into the air.



The Book Worm

AMERICAN MOTHER, by Colum McCann with Diane Foley Bloomsbury, \$38.99

The American mother of this memoir is Diane Foley, mother of American journalist James (Jim) Foley, who was kidnapped in northern Syria and




American Mother

What motivated my interest in this book was that I wanted to know how a mother copes when one of her children is held in captivity in a brutal place for over two years. I wanted to know how she coped with his death that was so public and violent. And how did she get through the days and years in the ten years since his murder.

This book is much bigger than a mother's story of worry and grief. We learn about Jim's moral courage that drove him to become a war journalist and tell the truth about its terrors. We learn about the hypocrisy of governments and the policy that makes it illegal to pay ransoms to terror organisations. We learn about the James Foley Foundation, a lobby group to change policies dealing with American citizens held in illegal captivity. And we learn about the importance of protecting journalists so that they can tell the world what is happening in war zones.

The first and confronting chapter describes Diane Foley's meeting with Alexanda Kotey, one of her son's murderers. She doesn't know what she is hoping to achieve from this meeting. Her husband and other families refuse to meet this man. The meeting does not give her closure. Life is messy. This is not fiction. But she did it because it was what Jim would have done.

And that is why she wrote this book; it is what Jim would have done. It gives her solace that her son will never be forgotten, and I am personally glad that I've read this story. The book is dedicated to the other three hostages who were killed with Jim, 'and to mothers everywhere.'

What is the Better Man Workshop?

It's a workshop for males that want to improve.

It's pretty simple so we'll keep it pretty simple.

We'll have a yarn, do some training and eat some steak.

Here's a bit of context around me.

When I was younger I was lucky enough to be around a great bunch of humans. These humans were opposite to tall poppy syndrome. At every opportunity it was the herd lifting up the weakest link not the herd bringing down the person aiming to achieve.

I also used to be the kid at school that refused to stand up and do a speech. I'd be the middle of the road achiever who didn't stand out and wasn't overly social or fond of big groups.

I've had a lot of challenges in life. Some small and some large. Some have been overcome quickly, most of them take longer than the person next to me. All of them have increased my confidence in myself when it comes to adapting to any situation that I get put into.

Many of the challenges I've overcome have been through the implementation of some very simple principles and dare I say it, conversations with myself (I had lots of conversations with myself when completing a 160km run and that's a whole different story).

Now I find it easy to get up and speak in front of people, have a strong solo focus and can find myself having conversation with anyone and everyone.

Why now?

I thought life was going as it was meant to. In hindsight it was going as if I was on someone else's path, so how did I get there and what changed it?

I followed the path of what I thought was good for me. What sounded good to everyone else. I finished all my schooling although I'd had enough by the time I was 15-16. I went to Smedley Station to learn more about practical farming which was hands down the best 2 year period of my life. Followed by 3 weeks at Outward Bound which was another outstanding period of my life. Then 3 years at Lincoln University before starting as a Rural Graduate with the National Bank. Dad got diagnosed with cancer, I lost my other brother to depression, and my world was rocked.

Since then my perspective for life has changed. Everything has a purpose now. You might be on the path of your dreams or you might be a little bit lost. I still constantly find myself lost which means I'm constantly reconfirming what I'm doing and why.

If you just want to come along for the steak that's cool. Ideally you'll come along because you want to learn something so you can change something. From what I've learnt, we all have our own answers. All it takes is for some to ask us the right question.



It feels like time.

Time to pass on some of the skills and knowledge I've learnt. Time to ask you that question that you know you need the answer for. I'll leave you with this - are you going to keep living the same 6 months every year for the rest of your life or are you willing to make it better?

Health and Wellbeing

'Addiction looks awesome, I want to be an addict!' <u>said</u> <u>nobody, anywhere, ever!</u>

Despite this, whilst it may not affect one personally; everyone knows or knows of an addict and everyone has an opinion regarding addicts and addiction.


Like all the best coaches, addiction coaches have 'been there, done that' and the length of time we've been 'clean/in remission/in recovery' is a common question. For the huge majority of us, this is harder to answer than you may imagine. Although the substances and behaviours we formed excessive dependencies upon were potentially (and in our case were definitely) 'addictive' – the establishment of our <u>dependency</u> upon them had little to do with the substances or behaviours themselves, but was just one of the symptoms of an illness that we 'contracted' during adolescence.

For most Western adults, consumption of caffeine and alcohol is a normal part of daily life - as are chips, lollies, cake and 'bargain' online shopping – we all know they're not great for our health or wallet in the long run, but we do it anyway. For the millennials and Gen Z's among us, social media posting/scrolling and video gaming is a normal part of daily life – most will be aware that it's not a mentally healthy use of their time – but continue anyway. Overworking does not have a positive effect on health but some people have to do it anyway. We all have painkillers in the medicine cabinet even though we know they'll only treat a symptom of what ails us and not heal the ill itself. A scratchy card is an exciting treat in a birthday card – we KNOW its likely to be a waste of money, but we're happy to get scratching anyway. Exercise is great for our health and we all know it - but not enough people do it regularly anyway! (Eeek had to get that in there!)

The point? Every one of those ordinary parts of daily life and more, <u>including</u> exercise, have the potential to be addictive and at least one will feature strongly in your own life. NO! I'm not suggesting that you yourself are an addict – just that the term 'addiction' requires quantifiable definition.

Addiction can be defined as 'a compulsive or excessive dependency on any particular substance, activity or behaviour.' Thus, if you read the above and smiled to yourself secure in the knowledge that you do all or some of those things but, 'So what?!'.... Well, it means that you're able to engage in any substance, activity or behaviour you choose without any significant negative impact on your daily life or the lives of those around you. Which is brilliant! Unfortunately, for those of us who 'contracted' (and never fully healed from) an illness called Childhood Trauma during our adolescence, these and other normal parts of daily life - become a band aid for the scar tissue, a Panadol for the pain, a hug for the hurt. Unhealed childhood trauma is the # 1 cause of addiction

in adults and having defined addiction, we'll discuss childhood trauma in more depth next issue.



Our Wider District

The Evening Sky in March 2024

Jupiter is the 'evening star', appearing in the northwest at early twilight. It sets around 11 pm at the beginning of the month and 9 pm at the end. The Moon will be near Jupiter on the 14th.

Northwest of overhead is Sirius. It is the brightest true star in the sky. Southwest of the zenith is Canopus, the second brightest star. Below Sirius are bluish Rigel and orange Betelgeuse, the brightest stars in Orion the hunter or warrior. Between them is a line of three stars: Orion's belt. To southern hemisphere star watchers, the line of stars makes the bottom of 'The Pot'. Orion's belt points down and left to a V-shaped pattern of stars. This makes the face of Taurus the Bull, upside down to us. The orange star Aldebaran is at one tip of the V making one eye of the bull. Continuing the line from Orion down and left finds the Pleiades or Matariki star cluster, low in the northwest. It sets after 10 pm, mid-month.

The handle of "The Pot", or Orion's sword, has the Orion Nebula at its centre, a glowing gas cloud. It is a place where dust and gas in space are gathering to make new stars. Some of the stars are much bigger and hotter than the Sun. Ultra-violet light from them causes the left-over gas to glow, making the nebula.

Near the north skyline are Pollux and Castor marking the heads of Gemini the twins. Though paired in mythology, the two stars are not related at all, being at greatly different distances. Above and right of them is the star cluster Praesepe, looking like a Moon-sized glow. It makes the shell of Cancer the crab. Praesepe is also called the Beehive cluster, the reason obvious when it is viewed in binoculars.

The Southern Cross is in the southeast. Below it are Alpha and Beta Centauri, often called 'The Pointers'. Alpha Centauri, the brighter Pointer, is the closest naked eye star.

The Milky Way is brightest in the southeast toward the Southern Cross. It becomes broader lower in the southeast toward Scorpius. Above the Cross the Milky Way can be traced to nearly overhead where it fades. It becomes very faint in the north, right of Orion, where we are looking toward the Galaxy's nearby edge. The centre of the Galaxy is in the broad part of the Milky Way below Scorpius in the southeast.

The Clouds of Magellan are high in the south sky. They are easily seen by eye on a dark moonless night, looking like misty patches. They are nearby galaxies, smaller than our Milky Way Galaxy.

The full Moon might look a little odd on the 25th as it grazes the outer part of Earth's shadow, the penumbra. It will be most in the shadow around 8.13 pm NZDT. The top edge of the Moon will be darkest.

Aorangi FMG Young Farmer of the Year

Coming in close behind was: Samuel Allen, Pleasant Point Young Farmers and Marcus Frost, Five Forks Young Farmers.

Gareth is Ravensdown's Agri-Manager for Seadown - Central South Island, and is a member of the Pleasant Point Young Farmers.

It was an epic day in Kurow! Sun was out, and so was the talent!

"I'm stoked to get the win, my goal was to take out the trophy and earn a spot at the Grand Final," McKerchar said.



Bright planets are in the dawn sky. Venus is the brilliant 'morning star', rising soon after 5 a.m. at the beginning of the month and around 6:30 at the end. At the beginning of the month Mars is just above Venus, looking like a medium-bright reddish star. It moves up and away from Venus. Later in the month, Saturn appears and moves up the sky morning-to-morning. It is the same brightness as Mars. On the 22nd Saturn will be just to the right of Venus, with less than a full Moon's width between them. Mars and Saturn move up the sky while Venus stays put. By the end of the month Mars, Saturn and Venus are roughly equally spaced on a line. The Moon will be near Venus on the 9th.

Meeting people in our community ...

Dick Guard shared some of his fondest memories of his life and adventures in Fairlie.

How did you get into building?

The day I turned 15 years old my Dad asked me if I wanted to start work. My only interest at school was wood-working so I took the opportunity to enter the workforce. I started as an apprentice boat



builder in 1948 and then did 17 years as a joiner until 1970 when Graham Cuthill and myself started up on our own as Guard & Cuthill.

Fairlie is an odd place for a boat building yard, how did the boat building start up?

When the ammunition factory shut down, Stan Jones was interested in radios and made his own. Along with the radio shop in Fairlie, they decided they would set up to make radio cabinets for Phillips in what is now the Museum Café. The radio cabinets were never built, they started off building small row boats instead.

We built ten launches and over 130 rowing boats. The largest launch was 60ft named The Linora and it was built for Mr R W Butcher from Auckland (pictured below in transit in Stafford Street, Timaru).



A boatbuilder started up in Timaru, he was able to launch straight into the harbour, whereas we had the transportation cost of a vessel from Fairlie, so this ultimately sealed the fate of building boats in Fairlie.

What is your most memorable moment?

Both Merle and I really enjoyed volunteer work down at Moreh, we used to bottle up fruit and vegetables. I had also completed some building work on Moreh over the years. I laugh now as they always said there would always be a bed for me when I needed it!

My biggest achievement however, one I am especially proud of, was the building of the boat ramp and Power Boat Club at Lake Tekapo.

We were some of the first to go boating on Lake Tekapo. As more people with boats appeared we decided that we should form a club. Once the club was started, we realized the need for a boat ramp. With the required permission we started construction. A local farmer loaned the club £90 to buy the cement for the build.

It was shortly after the completion of the ramp we decided a clubhouse was required. So again, we went through the permission process. We ran gala days to fundraise and sourced discounted products to be able to build the clubhouse debt free.

Merle and I still go up there and sit under the verandah and have lunch.

Football and Stars

I stumbled across the Monday night football meetup a couple of weeks ago and was surprised at the large

group of locals that had gathered to kick a ball around – so I called up Mikey: "When did your football meetup get so big??"... and so the conversation started.

Mikey Tetley is Day Guides Team Leader at the Dark Sky Project. He has been in Tekapo/Takapō for 2 years now.



So, I know you've come from Rotorua, have you always been an ambassador for Te Reo and Te Ao Māori?

Actually, no! I grew up quite detached from it. I was whangai: raised by a different family, not connected to my own. It wasn't until later that I got interested in Te Ao Māori. I did the usual subjects at school, and then at Uni I studied Education and Psychology, but it was there that I started sitting in on my mate's Te Reo lectures. I wasn't enrolled, I just went along. So after completing my degree I began to reflect on it all – I felt a need to reconnect to Te Ao Māori, to immerse myself in it and to uphold it. Finding my way to Te Ao Māori has been a journey. Taking the Dark Sky Experience has been a great step in this direction for me!

And why Takapō?

I heard glowing reviews about Takapō from my old school mate Tu! He's been here a little longer, he's getting us all down here one at a time!

You stuck around, I'm guessing Takapō didn't disappoint?

Not at all! It surprised me how big life is here – I thought I was moving to a quiet little place in the mountains, but there is so much happening, it's so big. You can get lost in the landscape. And it's big in terms of community, everyone is so welcoming. You don't get that in the city. Takapō fells like a different country: I love how integrated we are with all our different cultures, unlike anything I've experienced before. I think I've learned more about the world here than ever, even in my studies – it's cool.

No plans to leave any time soon then?

No, I love it here and the work is rewarding: my role at Dark Sky is frontline in Astronomical Tourism.

We share the stories of the night sky, the tools of our history and the knowledge of the Māori - the deeper roots in our wonderful little nation! People come in with no interest and no knowledge of Te Ao Māori and Tatai Arorangi (Māori astronomy) and they leave with both. It feels more meaningful than just a tourism activity. I am very lucky to be a part of the Takapō community, and in an exciting role where I learn and teach every day!

So, back to the football meetup, how did that start?

Well, my other old school mate Eli and I used to play back in Rotorua, socially, so when we came to Takapō we just started putting a message out each week, to gather a few players together for a kick around. And it just grew from there. We have a regular group now, with some very skillful players – they've come from all over: Argentina, Chile, Slovenia, France, the Netherlands, Germany, Czech Republic, Fiji, India, Japan, Uruguay, Mexico, the UK, Russia... and some Kiwis as well, of course! To be honest, it's become quite a challenge just trying to keep up with them! We still put the message out every Monday, but it's so well established people would turn up regardless.

Nice one Mikey! Sharing your knowledge of our Tangata Whenua and welcoming the world into our little community. We hope you'll stick around for sure.

Community Update



Tekapo Power Scheme – Summer Community Update

Kia ora.

The new year is well underway, meaning it's time for a community update from the team at the Tekapo Power Scheme.

Seasonal Changes - Summer

An increase in inflows has seen the lake level rise over the summer months. Currently, Lake Tekapo is approximately 707.03 metres above sea level and around 65% full.

The El Ni ño weather pattern is expected to persist, which will likely result in more variable rainfall patterns than El Ni ño events experienced in the past. Rainfall in the coming months is predicted to be above normal or near normal, with occasional strong fronts, lows, and atmospheric rivers forecast for autumn which may bring heavy rainfall, having the potential to increase lake inflows and levels.

Project River Recovery

Project River Recovery (PRR) is a Department of Conservation (DOC)-led programme to maintain and restore habitat in the Upper Waitaki Basin. Genesis in partnership with Meridian have been proudly supporting the initiative since 2011. Last year Genesis, Meridian and DOC were pleased to announce a new agreement which will see an increase in annual funding for PRR from \$666,000 to \$2.3m.

The week before Christmas we received an exciting update from the PRR team who recently recorded more than 300 black-fronted tern nests on Tern Island / Motu Tarapirohe. This is in stark contrast to this time last year (2022) when the colony site was abandoned due to heavy predation.

Clearly the PRR team's extensive predator and weed control efforts are paying off, but there is plenty more work to be done with efforts now being concentrated on chick counts. Chick numbers during the recent walk-through were "well over 100" which is fantastic news. Keep up the good work team!

Recreational Releases

The 2023/24 recreational releases for the Tekapo River Canoe Course are well underway. A total of 29 recreational releases are scheduled this season between the 9th of December 2023 and the 17th of March 2024.

Mackenzie District Council

Towards the end of 2023 Genesis and Mackenzie District Council (MDC) in consultation with the Tekapo Community Board were pleased to sign a new agreement which reaffirms our commitment to work together to provide positive outcomes for the Tekapo community. The new agreement will replace the current agreement upon Environment Canterbury granting replacement resource consents for the Tekapo Power Scheme, which are currently being processed by Environment Canterbury.

Included in the new agreement is the Genesis Community Fund, a contestable community fund to support Tekaporelated initiatives in the areas of community enrichment, education and environmental enhancement. Once the new agreement becomes operative, a contestable fund of \$50,000 will be available every two years.

Genesis will also make available funding to MDC to assist with upgrading the existing boat ramp and/or lakeshore enhancement projects, once the new agreement is becomes operative.



Behold, I Make All Things New (Revelation 21:1–8)

This was the theme of the last Catholic summer camp, 'Hearts Aflame' in Palmerston North that I attended in early January 2024. The camp is an annual event for over 170 young adults aged between 18 and 35. It was a vibrant festival of young adults who gathered to meet, and support each other in their faith and life journey. Some had returned to the camp multiple times, while for most, including myself, it was their first experience. The camp spanned 10 days and included a comprehensive schedule.

I went to the camp with the hope of catching up on some much-needed sleep after a busy Christmas, but to my surprise, it proved to be an intense experience. Each day, young people gathered at 6.30 am for adoration in silence, chanting morning hymns, followed by breakfast, a talk on a specific topic, Mass, lunch, and small group discussions. The afternoons provided breaks for the participants to relax with sports, walks, casual chats, and catch-ups. I found myself occupied with answering their questions about faith and life experiences.

Evenings consisted of dinner, more group discussions, singing praise and worship, and additional sessions of adoration and confession. In each of these young adults, I recognized that the Lord is doing something new in New Zealand. They came with eager faith and a readiness to listen and believe in the Lord Jesus, seeking an alternative to the secular world's offerings. Unlike mine and some older members of our faith communities whose faith's formation and piety have been more dependent on our parents, these young adults are determined to stand up for their beliefs and committed to choosing Jesus as the Eternal Shepherd by themselves.

Indeed, Cardinal, the late Pope Benedict XVI, once wrote in his book "Ministers of Your Joy" that the parable of the Sower in Luke 8:4-15 may make us feel as if the Sower is sent out to achieve nothing, to fail. Yet, there are always seeds that bear fruit for the harvest. There are numerous perils opposing the seed's growth—unworkable stony ground, weeds, bad weather—yet, despite all odds, some seeds germinate and thrive for the harvest. This is an image of hope and trust in the power of the Holy Spirit and the kingdom of God. Jesus wants to convey that all truly fruitful things begin in this world with what is small and hidden. Somewhere in silence, their seed is ripening. Nothing is in vain. Secretly, the world lives from the fact that people continually believe, hope, and love.

Lake Opuha on 13th February 2024, showing capacity at 34%

As of Friday, 23 February, Lake Opuha was at 25% capacity and continues to decline.

Opuha Water and key stakeholders are monitoring the lake level closely and have been regularly assessing the need for irrigation restrictions. The lake is at the lower end of its normal operating conditions but, to date, has been able to provide for the required environmental flows and irrigation demand.

As the lake level decreases, Opuha Water reminds the community to be vigilant when recreating at the lake as there might be old trees or debris exposed and areas where sediment has been deposited making shallow islands.

Please do not use the lakebed for 4WD activities, there are drop offs and soft areas where vehicles could get stuck.
