

# AS amphetamine addict Andy Warhol famously commented, 'When people are ready to, they change..'

But what IS change? The concept of 'addiction' is synonymous with something that requires 'quitting.' However, its often NOT the substance or behaviour that requires addressing first. Instead, one must initially consider the very foundation of an individual's addiction: What created the fertile soil required to nourish a substance or behavioural seed into taking root and ultimately growing into an addiction? Understanding the past offers an authentic opportunity to lay new and solid foundations for a future path that leads one steadily away from dependence on a substance or behaviour.

As mentioned last issue, unhealed Childhood Trauma is the #1 cause of addiction in adults. 'Trauma' is the Greek word for 'wound.' Childhood trauma – physiological adolescent wounding - occurs when 'the level of stress caused by exposure to a negative experience/a period of ongoing challenging experiences overwhelms the adolescent's ability to cope'.

How exactly can stress that occurred in childhood scar an adult? Surely we just grow up, right? Wrong.

If the stressor occurred at an age or time period when the child wasn't emotionally equipped to deal with it, it has the potential to overwhelm and dysregulate their body's stress regulation system – their hypothalamic-pituitary-adrenal (HPA) axis. HPA axis dysregulation in childhood has lasting negative effects on *ongoing* HPA axis activity in adulthood. le. It maintains a constant state of arousal – and results in <a href="maintains-physiological">physiological</a> changes within the body, thus contributing to a <a href="maintains-biological">biological</a> vulnerability which underlies an impaired ability to deal with stress. Which increases the risk of developing coping mechanisms in adulthood.

Addictive behaviours may be an individual's best attempt to cope with childhood trauma's biological and neurobiological effects - hyperarousal or disengagement. Depressants that slow down the central nervous system (such as alcohol, benzodiazepines, opioids, and cannabis products) offer a reprieve for people with the constant anxiety of chronic hyperarousal that results from dysregulated stress systems. Others protect themselves from the feelings of hyperarousal during prolonged traumatic experiences by dissociating - leading to chronic numbness and disengagement. Activities such as selfharm, sex and gambling can temporarily stimulate them from this state of numbness (as can cocaine, amphetamines, synthetic drugs and nicotine).

With such 'coping mechanisms' one may try to manage symptoms such as anxiety, depression, social withdrawal, hypersensitivity and insomnia and to handle triggers like external stressors. Eventually, a reliance develops on the chosen method of self-medication. This cycle facilitates the link between trauma and addiction.

#### Richmond Hut Circuit via Stag Saddle - Tekapo

This is a very good overnight tramp right on our backdoor, visiting three historic huts and seeing some amazing country traveling over the Two Thumb Range twice.

Drive up the Lilybank Road and park at the Mt Gerald/
Coal River easement - this is past the Round Hill Ski field
turn off. Packs on and off you go uphill. Sadly you will see
an awful lot of wallaby sign. You will tramp past the Rex
Simpson Hut, then it's an amazing climb up to Stag
Saddle following a very good track that is poled. Stag
Saddle is your high point for the first day. Enjoy it. Then
a nice decent following the poled track and creek to the
Royal Hut, the first of the historic huts. This is a busy hut
during the summer with Te Araroa walkers, but you can
stay here. If not, then turn right and head upstream to the
precious historic Richmond Hut. It's about 2.2km up Bush
Stream. No more markers to follow now, and some maps
don't have the hut marked.

It has recently been restored, and even has a fire. Only four bunks, so pay to take a tent during the summer. This is where we stayed the night. Make sure you use the Thunder Box!!! Was fun spotting deer and tahr from the

Next day, and it's a nice walk up to a tarn between high points 2001m and 2033m, taking the first valley upstream of the hut on the right. Just have to pick your way now, no markers, which is quite liberating!!

At the tarn is a memorial to Lewis and Creig families. Such a special spot. Then a little climb up the shingle to the Saddle over the Two Thumb range. Great views in all directions from here.

Now there's another descent down through the tussock, dropping off a terrace and onto the valley floor. There is a very good swimming hole in the lower valley, about 2km up from Camp Stream Hut. We stayed on the true right, which took us down to the third historic hut - Camp Stream Hut. A good spot for lunch and talking to the Te Araroa walkers. Very busy spot.

Packs on again, and the last walk back to your vehicle retracing your steps - that's after you climb out of Camp Stream via the 4wd track.

This can be tramped in either direction. Map BY 17 Lake Tekapo. These can be purchased from the Fairlie Resource Centre and you will need it! Hope you have good weather like we did. Enjoy!

#### **Cannington School**

On Tuesday, we went on a field trip to see the Richard Pearse Memorial. It was 31st March 1903; he was the first New Zealander to fly. Unfortunately, he crashed. If it had been recorded properly, it would have been the first flight in the world! Some people don't believe this, but we do!

Richard Pearse grew up in Waitohi. During his lifetime all he wanted to do was fly; so he did! We did drawings of his plane. It was really funny, when the plane started to turn. We all gasped, thinking it was about to fly!

Our next stop was the Aviation Museum at Timaru Airport. We went up to the look-out tower to see the Air New Zealand plane take-off. We could see the whole airport from the tower. We looked around the Richard Pearse exhibition. In the other hangar were lots of old planes and even some we could sit in. The highlight was getting to try out the Air-raid alarm. It was really hard to turn the handle; but not for Eleanor, her muscles were really strong!

Next we went to the Pleasant Point Pool to practice for the swimming sports next week. We were able to swim full lengths, the same distance as the sports races. Kiri very kindly came and taught us diving skills and turning.

Finally we had wind at Cannington School! Kite flying has begun! Angus, got a kite up about 20-30 metres off the ground. We thought he was going to take off with it. Luckily, our rule is; if your feet leave the ground, let go! But don't wait until you are as high as the trees before you do! Annie made one kite do loops and another one went into a tree; but was rescued by a big gust of wind and it just kept flying. We think our faeries may have helped in this rescue! We had the time of our lives.

On Wednesday we had our first assembly of the year. Hadley, Belle and Arthur got certificates. We talked about what we have learnt about flight in the last few weeks. We told parents about all the 'firsts' that have taken place in South Canterbury – First New Zealander to fly was Richard Pearse in 1903. First airmail drop over Temuka was in March 1914. First airline began at Washdyke in 1920 – some of the old hangars are still there! The last 'first' was a glacier landing in 1955.

After all the talking, we took our parents outside, to teach them how to fly our stunt plane; they are now retrieved from the trees and fixed. Now they all want to get their own!


#### Fairlie Primary School

#### SMALL THINGS LIKE THESE by Claire Keegan Faber, \$24.99

As a bookseller, it is always tempting to reach for the next exciting new publication, forcing many great books from previous years to remain at the bottom of the reading pile. One such book was *Small Things Like These*, by



Irish author Claire Keegan. This novella was shortlisted for the Booker Prize in 2022, but several locals finally convinced me to read it. I was not disappointed.

The book is set in 1985 in a small Irish town. Bill Furlong is a coal merchant and lives a modest but comfortable life with his wife and five daughters. There were rumours in town about the 'training school for girls' in the convent up the hill but the community chooses not to look too closely at what goes on behind the high walls topped with broken glass. And then Furlong discovers a girl locked away in the convent's coal house, distressed, barely able to walk and asking to see her baby.

At the historical background of the story are the Magdalen laundries, an institute for unmarried pregnant girls and women that was funded by the Catholic Church in concert with the Irish state. The girls often suffered terrible abuse and their babies were adopted out or sold to rich Americans. This book is not really about the Magdalen laundries but about what one man does when he comes face to face with the reality of what goes on in the institute. "...he found himself asking was there any point in being alive without helping one another? Was it possible to carry on along through all the years, the decades, through an entire life, without once being brave enough to go against what was there and yet call yourself a Christian."

The quiet and unassuming style of this beautiful book reflects the quiet and unassuming hero of the story. Whether you read this novella as a parable about kindness or moral bravery, or as an investigation into the mechanics of complicit silence, it will stay with you for a long time. Wilma

# You might have noticed works along a section of the Ōpihi River, upstream of Allandale Bridge in recent weeks.

Environment Canterbury has been removing <u>Old man's beard (OMB)</u> from alongside the river. A declared pest plant that is listed on the Canterbury Regional Pest Management Plan 2018-2038 (CRPMP), this fast-growing vine can quickly spread, smothering even the tallest trees, compromising the integrity of flood protection vegetation.

"Some sycamore trees, which are listed as organisms of interest in the CRPMP, were so damaged by this weed growth that they were a fall risk and had to be felled," Environment Canterbury Rivers Manager David Aires said.

The cleared weeds were placed in windrows (mounds made of compostable material) aligned in chevrons along the direction of flow on the berm. This makes it easier to spray the weed to prevent further spread and, if the river breaks out, they can offer some assistance in re-directing the water back into the stream.

After clearance, the site has been left prepared for upcoming willow and poplar planting in the winter months, which is the ideal season for planting these varieties. Willow and poplar are the best plants for flood and erosion protection due to their root mass. Even in the most challenging conditions, this dense root structure forms a fibrous mat that protects bare soil from erosion and stabilises the riverbank. Once established, native species can then be introduced to assist with transitioning to a more bio-diverse river corridor.

While the willows are important to flood protection at this site, they will also play an important role in protecting the former landfill site downstream from erosion.

"The modern willow and poplar varieties used are sterile cultivars that still have unique root-binding benefits, without the risk of habitat loss due to invasive spread, and remain the best performing species to stabilise river berms in erosion-prone areas or where flooding poses a significant threat," David said.

The site will be sprayed to manage weed growth before

grass seed is laid.

Environment Canterbury has also connected with the Fairlie Lions Club, which is looking to do some native planting plots in the area, including alongside the cycle track that runs through this site.

In my quest to meet more locals, I am fascinated by the diversity of cultures in our community. And one of the great expressions of culture of course, is food. So I have made it my mission to extract a recipe from each, and to share that with you through this column.

So where better to start than our wonderful little Wednesday market: one of the highlights has to be the cakes at Little Fool's Bakery. I have heard many times from locals "Oh, Hana's been baking! See you at the market". They do look amazing, and you'd be forgiven for not noticing they are all 100% vegan!

Hana (Shuet Han Loh), you're one of the friendly faces at Four Square and I know you're from Malaysia. How long have you been in Tekapo?

I came to NZ in 2016. I started in Opotiki in the North Island on my 9 month working holiday. Then a friend in Tekapo told me I should come and work here for a bit. So in December 2016 I did. I thought it was



very beautiful, and I decided to stay, maybe one year. Then maybe another year.... but I'm still here!

#### And you've been working at Four Square all along?

Yes. I've done many different jobs there, and I enjoy seeing all the locals, having little chats with them every day. Like Stewie, he comes in every morning, I like that.

#### So Hana, tell me about your cakes? How did it all start?

I have a very sweet tooth, I always like to eat sweet things, like cakes for breakfast! I became vegan in 2020, I watched the devastation of the wildfires in Brazil and Australia: the forest is like a mother, and with it, all of the animals were dying. I wanted to do something. I thought changing my diet would be an easy way to reduce my carbon footprint, as we have a lot of vegetarian options in Malaysian food. Later I stopped eating eggs. I didn't want to give up cakes and baking! So I started researching.

#### Was it easy to find good recipes?

Hmmm, yes and no. Sometimes it would take a lot of trial and error. But the more I learned, the more I could adjust the recipes until I got them just right. I like my own versions. I look up to professional bakers now. I'm so impressed with how people came up with using things like aquafaba: how many times did they practice to get successful results?! We don't often think about all the trials and experiments when we eat a nice cake.

### So is that something you aspire to? Being a professional chef?

Not really, I just hope my baking makes people happy. When a kid takes a first bite of my cakes and their eyes light up, it makes me smile. Or when people who are allergic to dairy find something delicious they can enjoy! I like sharing my baking with people, so that they know that vegan cakes are very nice as well.

#### So how did you start your market stall?

My friends encouraged me because they really liked my chocolate cake, so I started with that. Just chocolate cake. Then I really wanted to eat something with custard, so I had to do lots of google and trials until I was very happy with my product. Then a friend wanted something more savoury, so I came up with a quiche. Now I make a lot of different things but I can trace each of my recipes to a friend, or a story. I like that. I love to see people enjoying my food.

# Well it sounds delicious but I'm not sure we are all up to putting in the effort you have ... do you have an easy vegan sweet recipe we can try?

Oh yes! I'll share my chocolate mousse with you. It's super easy and you can also do your own experiments substituting ingredients like milk or yoghurt or whatever takes your fancy! It's fun!

#### **VEGAN CHOCOLATE MOUSSE**

400g vegan yoghurt (room temperature)

180g dark chocolate

70g plant based milk

1 tsp vanilla extract

- Melt chocolate and plant based milk over boiling water.
- Mix in yoghurt and vanilla.
- Pour into 8 cups and refrigerate for at least 1 hour.

#### Quarterly Water Quality Report - February 2024

Opuha Water Ltd publishes its quarterly water quality reports for Lake Opuha and the wider scheme catchment to share with the community the results of our extensive water quality monitoring programme. The most recent Quarterly Water Quality Report to February 2024 is slightly different to previous reports in that it focusses on the eDNA monitoring that has been undertaken in the catchment/scheme area in December 2023 and January 2024.

eDNA is material left behind by organisms (e.g. fish, insects, birds etc.) as they move through their environment. This material might be skin, hair, scales, mucus, faeces and other cells or tissue. Monitoring eDNA can identify thousands of species of fish, insects, crustaceans, birds, mammals, amphibians, plants, fungi, bacteria, and other organisms.

#### Memory is Lost, but not Faith and Dignity

Medical advancements and technological developments have contributed to the longevity of human life, providing many with the opportunity to witness the unfolding life journey of their descendants. This is a cause of great joy and happiness for many people. However, this also poses challenges for both them and their families.

In New Zealand, as more elderly individuals live longer, the loss of memory has become increasingly prevalent. This loss leads to feelings of disorientation, fear, and even doubt about their God-given identity. A friend recently told me that she went to visit her husband, whose memory has declined significantly. He told her that if they were not related, he would have loved to marry her. This was humorous, and for her, it was romantic. This means that those who have cared for them understand that communicating with them is not easy. And so recognizing this reality is crucial for those who provide pastoral care to assist them in their ongoing spirituality. Each individual is unique and infinitely loved by God, and whether they are conscious of it or not, no one should rob them of their dignity.

Despite the challenges, a form of communication persists, although not in conventional ways. They comprehend the squeeze of hands, the touch of cheeks, and, in the case of a priest like myself, the singing of a soft hymn or an invitation to recite a prayer together. Often, family members are surprised to find that their loved ones can still recall prayers learned by rote since childhood. These prayers, imparted by strict nuns and brothers, remain a lasting aspect of their identity. Despite the loss of memories, health, physical beauty, and possibly wealth, the elderly have not lost their faith and the prayers embedded in their hearts. For them, memory is lost, but not faith and dignity.

#### Te Manahuna Aoraki Project Pest Elimination Operation – Integrated Pest Management Project

Te Manahuna Aoraki Project is closely working with our partners to protect and revitalise 310,000 ha in Te Manahuna/Upper Mackenzie Basin and Aoraki Mount Cook National Park. By eliminating invasive predators and other small mammalian pests, native animals and plants can thrive.

Zero Invasive Predators (ZIP), on behalf of Te Manahuna Aoraki Project, has completed a successful tussock dryland pest elimination trial and will now be completing a larger project to eliminate the pests in an area of approximately 4500ha bordered by the Cass River to North; Lake Tekapo to the East; Lake McGregor, Lake Alexandrina and the Glenmore Station boundary to the South; with the Joseph Valley Wetland and Fork Stream forming the Western boundary.

The public is advised of ZIP's intention to:

- Aerially apply the toxins sodium fluoroacetate (1080) and pindone;
- Apply sodium fluoroacetate (1080), pindone and potassium cyanide, by hand or in bait stations.

A detailed map of treatment area(s) may be requested at any time from ZIP.

The location(s) of where bait is applied aerially to public conservation land will also be displayed on DOC Pesticide Summaries website (www.doc.govt.nz/nature/pests-and-threats/pesticide summaries/), alongside details of the caution period following the treatment.

#### Dates:

The aerial operation will be delivered in two phases. Each phase will involve at least one application of non-toxic cereal pre-feed pellets (sown 5-7 days apart) followed by an application of toxic cereal pellets 7-10 days later (as weather allows).

Phase one will begin no earlier than late-January 2024, with exact dates dependent on weather. The first application of cereal pellets containing toxin will not occur before 1 February 2024. Phase two will take place a month after completion of Stage 1.

The ground-based application of potassium cyanide, pindone and sodium fluoroacetate (1080) will be carried out alongside the aerial operation. Non-toxic prefeed will be deployed ahead of toxin deployment for potassium cyanide and sodium fluoroacetate (1080).

#### **Bait Description:**

Aerial and hand application of sodium fluoroacetate (1080):

- Non-toxic pre-feed: Cereal pellet bait undyed beige in colour, OR, undyed chopped carrot;
- Toxic bait: Cereal pellet bait, dyed green with a toxic loading of up to 1.5g/kg sodium fluoroacetate (1080), OR, chopped carrot coated in up to 1.5g/kg sodium fluoroacetate (1080) and dyed green.

Aerial and hand application of pindone:

• Toxic bait: Cereal pellet bait, dyed green with a toxic loading of up to pindone 0.5g/kg, OR, chopped carrot coated in 0.17 g/kg pindone.

Application of toxic baits in bait stations:

- Cyanide paste, coloured blue, applied within a bait station in approximately pea sized baits, with a toxic loading of 500 g/kg potassium cyanide;
- Cyanide pellets contained in blue tree-mounted bait bags and/or'strikers', with a toxic loading of 475 g/ kg potassium cyanide;
- Sodium fluoroacetate (1080) cereal pellets or coated chopped carrot contained in bait stations, with a toxic loading of up to 1.5 g/kg 1080 and dyed green;
- Pindone up to 0.5g/kg cereal pellets dyed green, contained within a bait station.

#### Precautions:

When these toxins are being used, everyone living in, or visiting, the areas is advised:

- 1. Do not touch any baits or carcasses. Toxic baits and carcasses can pose a significant risk to human health.
- 2. Keep children under strict supervision, to ensure that they do not touch or consume baits.
- 3. Keep dogs under control at all times. Dogs are particularly susceptible to 1080 baits and poisoned carcasses, and should avoid these areas.
- 4. Do not consume meat taken from wild animals within or adjacent to the block, until the caution period has expired.
- 5. Follow instructions on warning signs, which will be placed at public access points to inform you where the toxins have been used.

#### If you suspect poisoning:

Contact your local hospital, or dial 111.

National Poisons Centre is available via 0800 764 766.

In the case of a domestic animal suspected of being poisoned, contact your local veterinarian.

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
