

Lake Opuha

The level of Lake Opuha recently dropped below 373m (5%), which means the 2023/24 irrigation season has concluded for Opuha Water Ltd (OWL) shareholders and water users.

The remaining three metres in the lake is retained for environmental flows in an effort to increase the likelihood that the Opuha/Opihi flows will stay connected, which is critical for the health of the river ecosystem.

Minimum flow requirements have also been reduced. OWL is transitioning to "natural flows" where inflows into the lake equal outflows from the dam. OWL will continue to collaborate with stakeholders to monitor the health of the downstream river and check if fish salvages are necessary.

While this is a situation that no-one in the community wanted to see eventuate, it is important to acknowledge that the Opuha Dam has done exactly what it was designed to do – provide environmental flows, community supply and reliable irrigation to the South Canterbury community.

Unfortunately the persistent El-Nino weather pattern we are experiencing along the East Coast has pushed the dam to the limits of what it can provide. Importantly, if the dam was not there, it is estimated by ECan that the 'natural' flows in the Lower Opihi River at State Highway 1 would currently be well under 1 cumec, a flow which would likely disconnect the river.

OWL and stakeholders are also turning their attention to what a lake 'refill' looks like, especially in light of NIWA predictions that the rest of autumn will remain dry.

As the lake decreases, Opuha Water reminds the community to take care when visiting the lake; areas that were wet will take time to dry out and vehicles can get stuck easily. OWL recommends that people not drive on the exposed lakebed.





The Book Worm

THE OBSERVOLOGIST A Handbook for Mounting Very Small Scientific Expeditions By Giselle Clarkson Gecko Press, \$39.99



Last week I was invited to Lake Tekapo

School to meet four children's authors who were on their annual Storyline Tour. The Storylines Children's Literature Charitable Trust of New Zealand aims to inspire children to enjoy the magic of books, especially books created for them by New Zealand writers and illustrators. One of the authors was Juliette Maclver famous for her Marmaduke Duck books. I say famous, but I wasn't familiar with Marmaduke Duck. Well, Juliette did such an amazing performance reading *Marmaduke Duck and Bernadette Bear* that from now on the pupils and I will never again NOT know Marmaduke Duck.

Another guest at the school was author and illustrator Giselle Clarkson. This is an author I was much more familiar with. Last year Giselle published a beautiful non-fiction hardback book: *The Observologist*. Giselle told the schoolkids that she was always interested in little critters and that to her own surprise the word '*observologist*' was not in any dictionary. According to Giselle the difference between an *observologist* and a scientist is that *observologists* make very small expeditions, every day. An *observologist* knows that there are extraordinary things to be found in even the most ordinary places.

The book is divided in five parts. The first part is all about *observology*, including an introduction to taxonomy and the rationale behind scientific names. The author does not shy away from complicated words, and I think that many an adult will also learn lots from this book. The rest of the book is divided into four main habitats ideal for *observology*. 'a damp corner', 'pavement', 'a weedy patch' and 'behind the curtains'.

This book is an antidote to boredom and an encouragement to observe our environment wherever we are. The book is full of facts, quirky and detailed illustrations, science and funny stories. It is playful, informative and perfect for 7-11-year-olds. I think we're lucky to have such an expert guidebook written specifically for Kiwi kids. If they weren't curious already, they will be after reading this.



There were two assaults reported at the same local Fairlie address with the victim requiring hospital treatment. Five local males are assisting police with their enquiries and several charges are pending.

All emergency services responded to a roll over vehicle crash on the highway between Fairlie and Kimbell. The driver and her child were not badly hurt luckily, and she has been dealt with for careless driving.

A Burkes Pass man has been charged with unlawful possession of a firearm and entering agricultural property with intent to commit a crime. He tried to evade the farmer at Mackenzie Pass when he was disturbed spotlighting on his farm but left his guad bike behind. The follow up detective work identified the offender.

There have been several reports of unlawful hunting at Four Peaks Station with hunters straying across the boundaries from the Blue Mountain DOC block and giving the hut users a fright by turning up at the private huts without permission. If you are out hunting, make sure you know where the boundaries are to your area as the onus is on you to get it right. If you are found on private property you could be prosecuted and/or have your firearms licence revoked.

I am constantly investigating frauds/scams mainly involving Facebook marketplace where the seller deletes their profile when they have got your money through a bank transfer. It is very unlikely you will get your money back if you get sucked in by one of these villains, so take all precautions to keep yourself safe. This is just another reminder to everyone to be very careful when dealing with purchases on the internet or dealing with people on the phone that want your information. Only deal with trusted sites or known people. They are always coming up with new and clever ways to scam your money from you.

Meeting people in our community ...



I had the honour to have a delightful afternoon tea at Roland Johnson's farm on Middle Valley Road.

Were you brought up farming?

No not at all, I was born in the middle of Dunedin 86 years ago. My parents were business people in Dunedin and they had no idea about farming. I left school at 18 years old, I think my parents thought I would go off to university, but all I wanted to do was to work on farms. I had a caravan and got casual work on farms for 4 years, South Otago, West Otago, Methven, Seafield and more. In between times I went to Lincoln College, and in 1957 I did Compulsory Military Training in Hobsonville, Auckland which I loved, it was an important part of my life.

How did you end up buying your own farm?

When I was 22 years old, I ended up doing a lambing season in Mitcham, Ashburton for a farmer Jimmy Logan. At the end of the short lambing season, he said to me it was time I had a farm of my own and he found me this farm that I still farm today. Along with the guidance of buying my own farm, the 436 acres here in Middle Valley Road, he advised me to "shear your sheep in winter with blades" and "sow your wheat in autumn", which is as true today as it was 62 years ago. I am incredibly thankful to Jimmy and his family who still keep in touch with me.

When did you met Margaret?

I met my princess at Lincoln College in 1958. Margaret was a Karitane nurse and turned down a wonderful opportunity in America as a live in Karitane nurse to marry me. I got married in 1963 to my sweetheart. We have three children who all live locally Andrew, Peter and my daughter Helen, and who all farm independently of each other.

What else stands out in your life?

When I built my big shed, I built it 43 foot deep so I could build a 40ft launch in it. It took me 12 years to complete the launch with the love and support of Margaret. I wanted to show my children that you could be a farmer and still have other interests. I was a farming bore.

Adrien Vilquin-Barrajon – Living in a Black Hole This week I got to chat with Adrien Vilquin-Barrajon, astronomy lover and musician, and one of the long-timers in our thriving Astro-Tourism sector.

Tell me about your journey here Adrien, how did you get to Takapo?

I came on my working holiday

like many others! In 2015, I had been working in Wellington and doing a bit of travel around NZ. I knew about the Mt John Observatory as a science writer in France, and always thought I would like to write about it. So when I passed through Tekapo I visited Mt John and dropped off my CV. I had gone on to work in Oamaru for a while when I got a call back with a job offer. That's when I joined Earth and Sky.

Anyone who's heard you speak knows you're a very passionate science communicator – how did it start?

I got my first toy telescope when I was 7. I've always loved science, and astronomy in particular. I ended up studying journalism, so I reconnected the two by doing science reporting. If I had known then that I would end up spending every night under the stars on Mt John and that I would have the opportunity to operate the biggest telescope in NZ I wouldn't have believed it!

What is it about astronomy?

I think astronomy is the most efficient science at removing the human out of the equation. It's on a different scale. In a way, every other science serves humanity somehow. Astronomy is a pure quest for knowledge – it serves no practical purpose.

Some people say they feel connected to the stars through astronomy, what do you think about that? Considering the vastness of the universe helps us realise how small we are, not just us but the earth, and everything around us – that's what gives us that sense of connection. When we realise that. It's not astronomy itself, but what you as a human reflect on through astronomy.

You stayed with Earth and Sky, through the transition to Dark Sky Project and right through COVID, helping rebuild the business. That's a long working holiday... Yes! When I started at Earth and Sky some of my colleagues teased me "you think you are here for a few months, but wait and see...." Tekapo is like a Black Hole: it pulls you in, not even light can escape it!

Brilliant! Why do you think that is?

The landscape, the job, the balance of activities and people from all over the world that keeps it vibrant, but still quiet enough to enjoy the rural aspect, the remoteness. Socially it feels like a university environment and there are a lot of people here sharing my same interest in astronomy. It has an innocence about it. Life feels easy here. The basics for a happy life are covered: it's social and diverse, there's beauty around you permanently, and all the modern comforts. There is really nothing missing.

Any other passions?

Music! I play guitar and a bit of bass; I like to compose a bit as well. It's my meditation. I play music every day for 30 minutes after work – it's my way of winding down.

What about home? Do you miss France?

No, just French food. Actually, I just miss good bread and affordable cheese. The rest I can cook myself.

Awesome! Care to share a recipe with us then? Sure, this is my go to, it's simple and very French:

Saucisse aux lentilles (serves 2-3)

Use a pot that is not too big and has a good fitting lid. Put 4 or 5 small scrubbed potatoes in it, about 200g French lentils (Puy), one or two onions, quartered, a Chorizo sausage (the kind they sell at 4 Square) a bayleaf and some thyme. I also like to put in a rasher of bacon. Add a bit of water, it doesn't need to cover everything, as the steam will do the rest. Put the lid on and simmer very very gently. Keep checking it until the lentils are cooked (everything else will be cooked by then). If you need to add more liquid, add white wine, not water. Once everything is cooked add another good splash of white wine and a good spoonful of Dijon mustard. Mix well and serve.

PS Just two days after this interview Adrien was involved in the successful hunt for NZ's 10th meteorite! Well done to all involved – how exciting!! See Page 16.

The Night Sky in April 2024

Jupiter is the 'evening star' at the beginning of the month, setting in the northwest 1½ hours after the Sun. It slips steadily lower, disappearing in the twilight by the end of the month.

Sirius, the brightest true star, appears midway down the northwest sky at dusk. It is soon followed by Canopus, southwest of the zenith. Below Sirius are bluish Rigel and orange Betelgeuse, the brightest stars in Orion. Between them is a line of three stars: Orion's belt. To southern hemisphere star watchers, the line of three makes the bottom of 'The Pot', now tipped on its side.

Below and right of Sirius is Procyon marking the head of Canis Minor one of the two dogs following Orion across the sky. Sirius marks the head of Canis Major, the big dog. The big dog's hindquarters are made by the bright stars above Sirius.

Low in the north below Procyon are Pollux and Castor, the heads of Gemini the twins, making a vertical pair of stars. The Moon will be beside Pollux on the 15th.

Above and right of The Twins is the Praesepe star cluster, looking like a hazy spot to the eye. It marks the shell of Cancer the Crab. Praesepe is also called the Beehive cluster, the reason obvious when it is viewed in binoculars. Praesepe is an old star cluster, hundreds of millions of years old, so its biggest and brightest stars have long ago burnt out.

Right of Praesepe, almost due north in the evening, is a medium-bright star Regulus. It is the brightest star in Leo the Lion. The curve of stars below Regulus outlines Leo's mane, upside down in our southern hemisphere view. A crooked vertical line of stars right of Regulus makes Leo's hind quarters with the brighter star further right being his tail. The Moon will be in the curve of the Lion's mane, below Regulus, on the 18th.

The lone bright star due east is Spica, the brightest star in Virgo. Spica marks the ear of wheat that the Roman goddess Ceres is holding. From her we get the word cereals for grain crops. Above Spica is the roughly kite-shaped constellation of Corvus the Crow. Some navigators called it "Spica's spanker (spinnaker)", the sail that towed Spica across the sky. Corvus was a handy cross-check that they were sighting on the right star. The full Moon will be just below Spica on the 23rd.

Crux, the Southern Cross, is high in the southeast. Below it, and brighter, are Beta and Alpha Centauri, often called 'The Pointers'. Alpha Centauri is the closest naked-eye star.

The Milky Way is brightest in the southeast above Crux. It can be traced to nearly overhead where it fades and becomes very faint in the northwest, right of Orion. The Milky Way is our edgewise view of the galaxy, the pancake of billions of stars of which the sun is just one.



Meteorite found near Lake Tekapo

New Zealand's tenth meteorite was found by a group of more than 20 searchers (Fireballs Aotearoa) just south of Lake Tekapo on Thursday. It's been 20 years since the last was found. The fireball was seen entering Earth's atmosphere on 13th March at a speed of 50-60 kms per second. The meteorite has now been sent to Otago University for further testing to verify it is from outer space.

University of Otago geologist Dr Marshall Palmer said the discovery was "amazing". "We have a network of meteor tracking cameras across the country - those cameras are connected to a global network which calculated its trajectory. That gave us a search area — we went out to search for it."

The Clouds of Magellan are midway down the southwest sky. They appear as two luminous patches, easily seen by eye on a dark moonless night. They are small nearby galaxies but still contain billions of star each.

Bright planets are low in the eastern pre-dawn sky. Mars and Saturn, the same brightness, make a vertical pair at the beginning of the month. Mars is reddish; Saturn cream-coloured. Brilliant Venus is directly below them, rising around 5:30 NZST. Saturn moves up the sky, nightto-night, while Mars stays put. On the morning of the 11th they will be just a full-moon's width apart. After that Saturn moves higher. At the end of the month Mercury appears, making an equally spaced line of Saturn, Mars and Mercury down the sky. By then Venus is rising at 6:30, just 50 minutes before the Sun. The thin crescent Moon will be just below Venus on the 8th.

Mackenzie District Council - Climate Change Adaption and Mitigation Strategy and Plan

Mackenzie District Council have begun work to develop a climate change adaptation and mitigation strategy and plan for the Mackenzie District. These will provide a practical approach to support the Mackenzie District to prepare and respond to the challenges of climate change. Chief Executive, Angela Oosthuizen said 'We have already experienced how our climate is changing with the intensity and frequency of severe weather events increasing and how that impacts our infrastructure. We also know understanding the impacts for Mackenzie is important so we can adequately develop an action plan for the resilience of our infrastructure and our future.'

Council successfully applied for and received funding for the preparation of a climate change adaptation and mitigation strategy and plan from the Three Waters Better Off Fund. The Better Off Fund supports communities to transition to a sustainable and lowemissions economy, by building resilience to climate change and natural hazards.

To inform the Strategy and Plan, a Climate Change Analysis and Literature Review has been done for the Mackenzie District to understand how the effects of climate change are expected be felt across the district. Working with mana whenua, community stakeholders, and project partners, the Strategy and Plan will identify the preferred options and pathways for the Mackenzie District to increase resilience to the impacts of climate change and reduce greenhouse gas emissions. 'We want a future where everyone in the Mackenzie District is confident and safe. In the Mackenzie we already know that together we can solve difficult problems. It is also important that we hear what is important to you.'

To develop the Strategy and Plan, the council will be seeking the input from the community. 'It's really important that the adaptation and mitigation actions are created with the community, for the community. It's an essential aspect of responding to climate change together. Holy Week: The Season of Hope

This Holy Week, Christians around the world celebrate the climax of the liturgical year – the Paschal Mysteries of Christ, which honor and praise God. It commemorates the suffering, death, and resurrection of the Lord Jesus, our Savior. The ceremonies of Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter are not separate; they form one continuous act of worship in which the Church annually relives the great events that grant us new life.

It is the Season of Hope because with God's constant loving gaze upon each of his sons and daughters, hope is constantly renewed from within, and new possibilities unfold. The story of creation tells us that God created everything from nothingness, and the growth of nature in creation reminds us that God's work is ongoing. As Jesus reminds us, "My Father has been working until now, and I have been working" (John 5:17-18).

In celebrating Holy Thursday, the people of God, such as the Israelites, remembered how God helped them escape the bitter condition of their slavery in Egypt and started a new life in the promised land. Good Friday is about how Christ bore our sinfulness, teaching us to accept and offer our own suffering as a fragrant offering to God in union with him and those who are suffering in the world. Here, suffering is an evil act, but Christ has given it meaning, namely, love to the end. Holy Saturday Vigil helps us commemorate Christ's Passover from Death into Life. The Light of Christ illuminates the darkness around us and helps us see the truth better, a truth that frees us from fears and hopelessness.

Finally, Easter Sunday draws our attention to the new life in Christ – the Resurrection – as Christ has risen from the dead and is alive among us. Pope Francis reminds today's youth, saying, "When you feel you are growing old out of sorrow, resentment, fear, doubt, or failure, Christ will always be there to restore your strength and your hope." If you have lost your inner vitality, your dreams, your enthusiasm, your optimism, and your generosity, Jesus stands before you as he once stood before the dead son of the widow, and with all the power of his resurrection, he urges you: "Young man, I say to you, arise!" (Lk 7:14). And today he says to each one of us – I say to you, Arise! (Christus Vivit – "Christ Is Alive" No. 2 & 20). *Fr. Tien Cao*
